

Democrats To Honor James Noland

Shindig Scheduled
Tomorrow at
McCormick's Park

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19.—"The man can meet and have fun. But they really can't do any business without us women."

That was the reaction expressed today by pretty Mrs. James E. Noland, wife and secretary of the Seventh District Congressman, when asked how she felt about not being invited to the big Democratic shindig honoring her husband to be held tomorrow at McCormick's Creek State Park.

The affair was arranged by Mayor Thomas L. Lemon of Bloomington, the Nolands' home town. President Truman, Vice President Barkley, Gov. Henry F. Schricker, Hoosier colleagues in Congress and other party big wigs were invited.

Sent Their Regrets

Mayor Lemon received regrets from the President and Vice President, but acceptances from numerous others. Despite the fact that she won her party spurs as a top-flight young Democrat before her marriage to Mr. Noland, Mrs. Noland wasn't asked because the party is strictly stag.

She plans, however, to be present next Monday night at the Shoreham Hotel here when her returned husband will debate Sen. George W. Malone (R. Nev.) on the subject "What Should Our Tariff Policy Be?"

The debate will be broadcast on the American Forum of the Air program and carried by station WIBC in Indianapolis. Mr. Noland will uphold the administration's reciprocal trade policy and Mr. Malone argue for a return to tariff.

The 29-year-old Congressman, an Army Captain in World War II, has been battling the General Chairman John Rankin (D. Miss.) on many measures in the Veterans Affairs Committee. This brought him favorable notice from the Democratic National Committee which handled the publicity for his debate with Sen. Malone.

Boy, 15, Awarded Hog Show Prize

Winning Litter Sold for \$885.60

A 15-year-old Crawfordsville boy today received an \$885.60 check in the sale of his grand champion litter of eight hogs at the 12 annual State Ton Litter Hog Show.

Kingan & Co. paid the show winner, Robert Gilliland, a record price of 54 cents a pound for his Berkshire-Hampshire litter. The show's champion hogs averaged 205 pounds.

In addition, the youth received \$40 for the grand championship award and first place in the lightweight class. The show and auction were held yesterday at Indianapolis Stockyards.

55 Cents Per Pound

Stark-Wetzel Co. paid 35 cents a pound to the reserve champion exhibitor and blue ribbon winner in the heavyweight class, William P. Davis, R. R. 3, Columbus.

Mr. Davis received a check for \$702.80 for his litter. He also won \$38 for his class placings.

Kingan & Co. was the top bidder at the auction, purchasing nine of the 17 litters offered for sale. The grand champion's 54-cents-a-pound figure was well above the prevailing market price of 21.5 cents.

Guests at the auction included Lt. Gov. John A. Watkins, Mayor Feeney, Arthur M. Thurston, state police superintendent, and Carl Tyner, secretary-manager of the State Fair.

Judges were Max Herrell of Herrell Bros., order buyers; and J. A. Hoefer of Purdue University. Approximately 300 persons attended the day-long show.

Ralph Purcell of Frankfort won a \$5 prize in spectator judging. The award was given for amateur judge whose tally came closest to the official judges' decision.

Worker Killed in Fall From Railroad Trestle


