

Reds Facing Darkest Hour In Australia

Have Made Both Government and Labor Hopping Mad

CANBERRA, Australia, Sept. 1—Australia's Communists are facing what may well be their darkest hour.

On the one hand, they have made a previously tolerant Labor Government hopping mad over Communist activities in this country.

On the other, rank-and-file union members have begun a strong revolt against the Reds' longtime control of Australia's biggest unions.

Clearly the greatest setback to the Reds is the collapse of the nationwide coal strike. Communist leaders of the powerful miners' federation called it June 27.

Miners Defy Leaders
The strike ended abruptly when the miners, once famed for their obedience to their leaders' orders, defied their executive by voting independently to return to work.

The principal reason for this defiance was a growing conviction in miners' ranks that their voice in union decisions was being ignored by their Red-controlled executive, and they voted 4-to-1 to go back to the mines.

Rank-and-file in other big Red-run unions are giving Communist leaders some uneasy moments, too.

Stress New Mood
Recent stormy meetings of the frontworkers further stress the new mood of Australia's union member.

National Secretary Ernest Thornton, an ardent Communist who has just returned from a trip to Russia, has been hoisted and jeered by his members, and Communist-inspired motions in these meetings have been defeated by rank-and-file.

The same mood is evident among the railroad unionists in Queensland, whose executive is Communist-controlled. The executive put a "black ban" on handling coal during the strike.

But the railroad workers handled it just the same. Although he seems determined to break the Reds' hold on his union, the average unionist may find that a tougher job than he now anticipates.

The labor government is aroused. Its ministers have frankly hinted at strong anti-Red measures, and they have blasted the Reds with increasing fire.

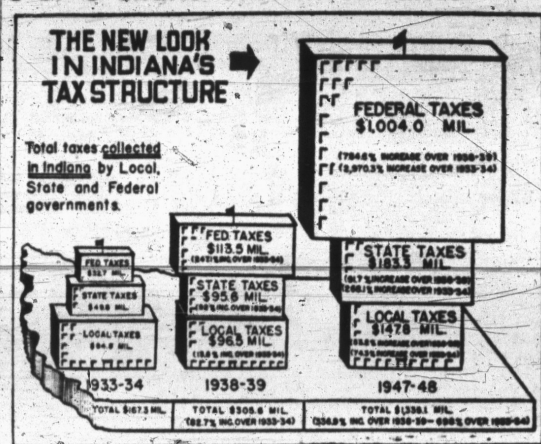
But in the final analysis, the government has yet to come forward with a program to end the Communist influence in this country. To a great extent, it would seem, the real fight against Communism here lies with the Australian unionists.

Court Challenges Spurlock Order

Judge Reeves Told To Show Cause

WASHINGTON, Ind., Sept. 1 (UP)—A state Supreme Court judge today gave Circuit Judge Ollie C. Reeves three days to release Mrs. Clarice Spurlock, 26-year-old housewife held in the investigation of her mother's death, or show cause why she is held.

Supreme Court Judge Frank E. Glikson's order came at the request of Mrs. Spurlock's defense attorneys. Judge Reeves yesterday ruled that Mrs. Spurlock must stay in jail until the Vanderburgh County Grand Jury can consider an affidavit issued by him.

A toxicologist yesterday reported finding an "enormous amount" of arsenic in the body of her father, Winter Dearing, 60, ex-husband at police request after they said a previous autopsy on Mrs. Dearing revealed that she had been poisoned.

Mrs. Spurlock is held on the affidavit at Evansville, Ind., after her arrest in Memphis several weeks ago.
