Only 4 Philly Players Sure of Jobs in 1950, Says Pilot Sawyer

Manager Leaves Spot Open for Waitkus, Shot by Love-Smitten Chicago Girl

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 2 (UPI)—Manager Eddie Sawyer said today Pitchers Robin Roberts and Ken Heintzelman and Infielders Willie Jones and Granville Hammer are the only players sure of their jobs with the Philadelphia Phillies next season.

Armed with a new two-year contract for himself, Sawyer left a spot open, however, for convalescing Eddie Waitkus, who ranked as one of the National League's outstanding first basemen before he was shot by a love-smitten girl in Chicago last June.

Waitkus, who is bent on playing again before the campaign closes, was labeled a question mark by the Philadelphia pilot.

\$60,000 Bonus Baby

Sawyer's singling out of Roberts and Heintzelman from his pitching staff was obvious.

Roberts, a \$60,000 bonus baby from the campus of Michigan State, licked a firecracker temporarily this season and has won 13 games.

Heintzelman, a 33-year-old southpaw, is enjoying the finest season of his major league career with 18 victories. Both he and Roberts are considered prospective 20-game winners in 1950.

Third-baseman Jones, known informally as "Puddin' Head" to his teammates, is Sawyer's idea of "a natural hitter with a good pair of hands." The chunky Jones, a drawing citizen from South Carolina, also provides the club with much of its long-ball punch.

Hammer, at shortstop, has developed into one of the finest defensive players in the circuit. A gluton for work, he has appeared in all of the Phillies' games and contributed several timely base hits.

Gets Full Charge

Sawyer said he would draw whatever other material he needed from the Phillies' vast farm system.

The 38-year-old manager, receiving his new contract yesterday, was placed in direct charge of all players throughout the



Willie Turnesa Faces Texan In U. S. Amateur Semifinals

Precision Shot Artist Seeks 3d Crown;
Bill Campbell, Charley Coe Matched

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Sept. 2—Wes Willie Turnesa of Elmsford, N. Y., turns his cold precision shots against Rufus King of Wichita, Tex., today in the 36-hole semifinal round of the National Amateur Gold championships.

And, since he was on the verge of his third United States title, Willie the Wedge was ready to bear down with all the tenacity at his command, least he fail victim to an upset similar to the many which have marked this unpredictable tournament.

The globe-girdling legislator from Huntington, W. Va., Bill Campbell, met Charley Coe of Oklahoma City in the other semifinal, fighting for the right to play in the championship duel on the wind-whipped Oak Hill Country Club course tomorrow.

Getting Tougher

Turnesa ruled favorite in his match today, and in the title match which he hoped would follow, but the going was getting tougher with every step.

Willie had his most grueling test to date in the round of 16 yesterday afternoon when he licked Frank Sifraci of Buffalo, N. Y., 3 and 2, after a morning victory over Charles Dudley of Greenville, S. C., by the same score. Sifraci had licked Turnesa in four-of-five previous meetings and had started out yesterday with a par when Turnesa's second shot plopped into a brook, and he was 2 up after the seventh. But then Willie took hold to take the eighth and ninth for an all-even match on the turn.

Bob Hamilton To Help Coach Butler Frosh

Signed as Assistant To Pop Hedden

Who Returns Here

Robert Hamilton, former Butler University grid star and June graduate, who was seriously injured last winter when struck by a car in front of the fieldhouse, has been signed by the university to help with the coaching of the Butler freshman football team.

President M. O. Ross today announced that Hamilton would assist Frank (Pop) Hedden, who resigned recently as head coach at Anderson College to take an assistant coaching job at Butler.

President Ross confirmed Hedden's appointment. Before going to Anderson, Hedden had been on the Butler coaching staff 18 years. Prior to that he had been an athlete at Butler.

Hamilton was a four-year letterman and Army veteran. He was selected the most valuable player last season. In addition to his coaching duties, Hamilton will resume his studies to work on a Master of Science degree.

It also was announced that Robert Dietz, assistant basketball coach, who resigned recently to go into private business, would continue to assist Hinkle with the hardwood team on a part-time basis.
