

## Dr. Joseph Howard Dies in Spokane

### Former Professor Of Latin at IU

Dr. Joseph Henry Howard, professor emeritus of Latin at the University of South Dakota, who died Wednesday in Spokane, Wash., will be buried in the family plot in Crown Hill, after services at 10 a.m. Tuesday in Flanner & Buchanan mortuary. He was 89.

Dr. Howard's wife, the late Mrs. Ella Lowe Howard died in 1957. She was a sister of the late Mrs. Charlotte Lowe Bryan, wife of Dr. William Lowe Bryan, Indiana University president emeritus.

Born in Frankton, Dr. Howard was awarded his bachelor's master's degrees from Indiana University. He was one of the first lettermen of I.U., having played right tackle on the varsity football team of 1886.

From 1893 to 1901, Dr. Howard was an instructor and an assistant professor of Latin at I.U. His Ph. D. degree was awarded by Stanford University in 1899. He also studied at Butler University, Johns Hopkins University and the University of Chicago.

Dr. Howard became adjunct professor of Latin at the University of Nebraska after leaving I.U. and in 1903 became professor of Latin at the University of South Dakota.

Following his retirement several years ago, he made his home with a son, Dr. Robert L. Howard, a physician in Spokane.

The elder Howard was a member of the Indiana University chapter of Beta Theta Pi fraternity and Phi Beta Kappa.

Another son, Harold P. Howard is editor and publisher of the *Sticksy* (South Dakota) Argus.

### William Saylor

William Saylor, retired employee of the Barbour Corp., will be buried in Glen Haven Cemetery after services at 1:30 p.m. tomorrow in the Conkle Funeral Home.

Mr. Saylor died yesterday in his home, 1038 Chadwick St., after suffering a cerebral hemorrhage. He was 82.

A resident of Indianapolis 20 years, he was a native of White County, Tennessee, and lived at one time in Kentucky. He was a member of the Methodist Church in Kentucky.

Besides his wife, Minnie, he is survived by three sons, Leslie D. and Delma Saylor, both of Indianapolis, and Haydon Saylor, Gallatin, Tenn.; two daughters, Mrs. Virginia L. Wiseman and Mrs. Nellie Rowe, both of Indianapolis, nine grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

### Linn D. Hay Dies in Tennessee

Services for Linn D. Hay, a former judge of the Marion County Superior Court, who died yesterday in the home of a son, Roger A. Hay, Nashville, Tenn., will be at 11 a.m. tomorrow in Flanner & Buchanan mortuary.

Burial will be in Crown Hill. He was 91.

A judge 16 years of the Superior Court, Room 2, he was first elected to that bench in 1914. He previously was city attorney during the first term of the Indianapolis Mayor, Charles Bookwalter.

Born in La Porte County, Mr. Hay taught in a country school before he entered Mt. Union College, Alliance, O., in 1881. He later spent two years in La Porte, studying law in the office of L. A. Cole. He was admitted to the bar in 1886.

In 1889, Mr. Hay was elected prosecuting attorney of Kingman County, Kansas. He came to Indianapolis in 1896, where he opened a law office in the Indiana Trust Building.

He was a member of the Tabernacle Presbyterian Church and the Modern Woodmen of America. He formerly was a member of the Indiana State Bar Association and Knights of Pythias. He retired in 1940.

Surviving in addition to his son is another son, Leo S. Hay, Lubbock, Tex.
