Men and women of all denominations are expected to attend the prayer retreat presenting Dr. Frank C. Laubach Thursday on the Boy Scout Reservation.

Dr. Laubach, who is a literacy expert and missionary with an international reputation, will speak at 10:30 a.m. and 2 p.m. His topics are: "The Mightiest Force in the World" and "Practicing the Presence."

The Rev. A. C. Brooks, pastor of the Third Christian Church, will open the retreat with a worship service and the Rev. Roy E. Connor Jr., minister of the Meridian Heights Presbyterian Church, will lead devotions at 1:30 p.m.

Time will be given for luncheon at noon. Discussion followed by silent meditation will precede the 4 p.m. closing.

Could Improve Lot

Dr. Laubach holds the theory that the underprivileged and illiterate could improve their lot for themselves if they could read the Bible and other helpful books. He therefore specialized in teaching men and women to read on the mission field.

Millions of persons are said to owe their ability to read to Dr. Laubach. He has been working among primitive peoples since receiving his Ph.D. degree at Columbia University in 1915. Dr. Laubach uses charts for teaching reading in more than 200 languages.

He will be sponsored here by the State Pastors' Conference and the Indiana Council of Churches.

Church of God Sets Meeting

Plans Open Air Services

WESTFIELD, Ind., Sept. 3—Bishop Homer A. Tomlinson, general overseer of the Church of God whose headquarters are in Queens Village, New York, will conduct an open air service in the Quaker meeting house here to-morrow.

Bishop Tomlinson will hold the service at 11 a.m. on the grounds of the former Chester Quaker Meeting House in remembrance of his father, the late Bishop A. J. Tomlinson. The late bishop preached his first sermon in the meeting house in 1892, according to his son.

The church no longer exists but the Chester Cemetery is here. Graves of the Tomlinson family dating back 200 years are said to be there.

Bishop Homer A. Tomlinson is stopping in Indiana en route to Red Bay, Ala., where he will conduct the 44th Annual General Assembly of the Church of God for seven days beginning Wednesday.

Bishop Tomlinson tells the story of how the late Aimee Semple McPherson and Father Divine began their ministries under his father. But neither Mrs. McPherson nor Father Divine would conform to the discipline required by the late bishop and so they severed their connection with his church.

There are various branches of the Church of God in the United States. One group maintains national headquarters in Anderson, Ind. Bishop Tomlinson says that all the branches stemmed from the denomination founded by his father.

Dr. Charles E. Brown will represent the Church of God, whose headquarters are in Anderson, at the meeting here tomorrow, according to an announcement made by Bishop Tomlinson.

Within a short time, the guests and their wives joined Mrs. Cooper and the Reeds in their country home.

Met at Station

Mr. and Mrs. Sutkowyj, or Anna and Dimitro, as they are now called, arrived in Indianapolis a little before noon, Sunday, Aug. 21. Mr. and Mrs. Reed, Mrs. Cooper and Cecil Beck met them at the Union Station. The newcomers went immediately to their new home on Epler Ave. for Sunday dinner.

Mr. Beck greeted the former displaced persons on behalf of the Garfield Park Baptist Church.

Anna, who is Polish, and Dimitro, of Russian parentage, really owe their reception in Indianapolis to Mr. Beck; as the story goes.

For Mr. Beck was impressed by two other D.P.'s who had come to the Real Silk Hostel Mills. He often spoke of them when he taught a group of young married couples in the Garfield Park Baptist Sunday school. The group is called the Home Builders Class.

The young couples became interested in bringing more refugees to the city through Mr. Beck's "promotion." They signed the necessary papers with the help of the pastor, the Rev. Walter A. Laciach, the Church Federation and others.

Both Keep Busy

Since coming to Epler Ave., Anna has made a complete dress, carefully tailored in every detail, and partially made several other garments. Dimitro, who was a refugee as a member of the International Refugee Organization as a building technologist and draftsman, has refused to co-operate with the authorities; Dimitro was sent

to a German prison camp—his first wife was killed, and his brothers, exiled.

Anna suffered a similar fate and fled Poland. She and Dimitro met in a displaced persons camp and after a time were married. They were enabled to start a new life in America because an Indianapolis family stood as sponsors for them.

Her association with the D.P.'s brought these words from Mrs. Cooper:

"No other experience in my life has meant as much to me."

Thinking of his hosts, the church people and all who have befriended him, Dimitro exclaimed:

"Only heaven could be better than Indianapolis."

She is seemingly unaware that there is anything odd about it. In addition to Polish, she speaks Russian, Ukrainian and some German.

The night they came, they insisted that we let them sleep on the living room floor; they're so humble; so eager not to inconvenience us. But, of course, we gave them a comfortable room."

Tell of Experience

Through interpreters and by de- greees, the D.P. couple have told some of their experiences. Dimitro belonged to a "well-to-do" family in the Ukraine, it seems. His people refused to co-operate with the authorities; Dimitro was sent

to a German prison camp—his first wife was killed, and his brothers, exiled.

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
