

Czech Priests Openly Oppose State Control

7000 Sign Church's Official Protest; 90 Per Cent Due to Fall in Line

A Catholic spokesman at Prague Czechoslovakia said today that more than 70 per cent of the 7000 priests in Czechoslovakia had signed a protest against an impending law putting the church under state control.

By the end of next week, the spokesman said, more than 90 per cent of the priests will have signed the protests. In addition, that an article entitled "Krilov (a Russian writer) or Aesop" was objectionable.

The article referred to Aesop's fable about a wolf who died after eating a lamb and Krilov's story of a small puppy who dared to bark at an elephant.

At the same time, unofficial estimates set the total casualties in the 13-day revolt of the national revolutionary movement at 361 dead and 764 wounded.

PREMIER Karl A. Fagerholm told parliament today that Communists definitely had failed in efforts to seize power by means of wildcat strikes and disorders.

HONG KONG, Sept. 8 (UP)—Reports from Canton said one American was shot to death and two others were wounded seriously during a quarrel early today.

H. D. Harris, 44, whose American address was not known here, died after being hit by three bullets. He was described as an explorer.

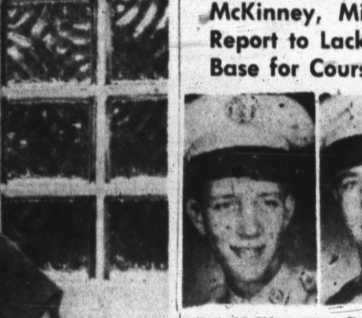

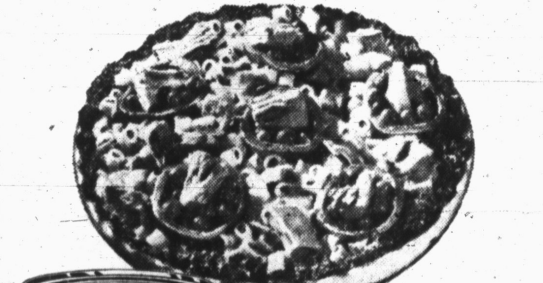
