World Report

Czech Priests Openly Oppose State Control

7000 Sign Church's Official Protest;
90 Per Cent Due to Fall in Line

A Catholic spokesman at Prague Czechoslovakia said today that more than 70 per cent of the 7000 priests in Czechoslovakia had signed a protest against an impending law putting the church under state control.

By the end of next week, the spokesman said, more than 90 per cent of the priests will have signed the protests. In addition, they are flooding the Central Action Committee of the National Front with individual protests.

If the report is correct, it means that the Catholic hierarchy in Czechoslovakia has achieved one of its main goals. That was to keep intact the main body of priests in solid front against the lure of the government-sponsored Catholic Action body.

The government's bill to take over the church was expected to become law when the national assembly meets late this month or early next. It includes the following provisions:

ONE: Government approval of all priests and higher clergymen before they can take office. This approval might be withheld "on grounds of political objections against the candidates."

TWO: Imposition of fines up to 100,000 crowns (\$2000) and jail sentences or both for disobedience.

THREE: Complete state control over all church finances.

FOUR: "Salaries according to this law will be paid to clergymen who are Czechoslovak citizens of good morale, who are reliable citizens of the nation and who otherwise comply with the general conditions applying to civil servants.

Finland

Premier Karl A. Fagerholm told parliament today that Communists definitely had failed in efforts to seize power by means of wildcat strikes and disorders.

For three weeks Communists had harried the nation's industry and administration. The strike campaign was set off by seven Communist-controlled unions, three of which have ended their walkouts.

Mr. Fagerholm said the remaining stoppages were "of no significance." He estimated the damage done by the strikes at nearly \$20 million.

The latest turn in the strike was an order to Finnish lumberjacks to go back to work, with no advantages gained and no pay for the time lost.

Italy

The Defense Ministry charged today that Russia, Yugoslavia, Albania and Poland had refused to provide complete details on missing Italians, military and civilian.

The ministry said 856 Italians were known to be held as war prisoners by the four countries.


