Silver Star Hero Killed in War

First Lt. J. Willard Carter, Indianapolis-born Silver Star hero, killed in the battle for St. Laurent, Aug. 8, 1944, will be buried with full military honors in the New Albany National Cemetery, New Albany, following services at 12:45 a. m. Wednesday in the Shrader Funeral Home there. He was 27. He will be buried in joint rites with comrade-in-arms, Cpl. Elmer E. Paul, son of John E. Paul, Ft. Wayne, who was killed in action with him.

Lt. Carter is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas O. Carter, 35 Woodland Drive. His father is a retired city policeman.

Graduate of Tech

A graduate of Technical High School, he worked six years as a sales correspondent for P. R. Mallory Co. before enlisting in the Army, Oct. 27, 1941. He attended Officer Candidate School at Ft. Knox and was commissioned a 2d lieutenant in June, 1942.

Before sailing for England in September 1943 he was promoted to the rank of 1st Lieutenant. He hit the beaches of southern France with the 33d Armored Regiment, Third Armored Division, on D-Day.

For six months after his death, Lt. Carter was listed as missing in action. His body and that of Cpl. Paul were later recovered and buried together in Belgium. His parents received the Silver Star awarded posthumously for bravery in action.

In addition to his parents, he is survived by a sister, Mrs. Cleo Chamberlain, Indianapolis, a niece and several nephews.
