Riley Therapist Speaks Today

Mrs. Frances C. Ekstam, Riley Hospital therapist, was the speaker today at the Welfare Club held in the Indianapolis Athletic Club.

She spoke on "Polio and Rehabilitation." "Rehabilitation," she said, "is important not only to the physically handicapped but to society in general."

The ultimate aim of a complete rehabilitation program," she added, "is to enable the totally disabled to become one who is as self-sufficient, and as socially and financially independent, as his physical condition will allow. He must learn to live with his handicap and not off it."

If the card drawn is a red trey, he places it face up on the table—meles any of his cards that he desires, but does not discard; and the hand is over.
