Asserts U. S., Britain Pledged Military Aid In Tito War With Russ

Hungarian Spy on Trial Unable to Say Where or How Alleged Promise Was Made

Lazar Brankov, former consul at the Yugoslav legation in Budapest, testified today in Budapest that the United States and Great Britain promised military support to Marshal Tito if he would fight Russia.

Brankov was the third of eight defendants in a treason and espionage trial to testify before the People's Court. The trial was in its second day.

Just before the session was adjourned at mid-afternoon, the court asked Brankov:

"What did (Yugoslav Interior Minister Alexander) Rankovic tell you about the agreement between Tito and the Anglo-Americans?"

Says Aid Promised

"I learned that the Anglo-Americans promised military support to Tito if he would fight against the Soviet Union," Brankov replied.

Brankov did not specify when, where or how the purported Anglo-American promise of military aid was made.

He pleaded "partially guilty" to the charges against him. A year ago he resigned his diplomatic post here in an alleged plot with Marshal Tito over the Yugoslav-Communist struggle. Now he is charged with spying for Marshal Tito while paying lip service to the anti-Tito Hungarian Communist regime.

Took Tito's Orders

Today he admitted that "as an old partisan I was accustomed to take every order from Tito." But, he said, he had another change of heart shortly before his arrest by Hungarian authorities, claiming he again was disillusioned with regard to Tito.

Today's testimony was to the effect that the defendant plotted to overthrow the Hungarian government in an overnight coup with 10 army battalions and form a "Balkan bloc" under Tito.

London

British Chancellor of the Exchequer, Sir Stafford Cripps, arrives home today to face continued rumors of devaluation despite official denials.

To add to his troubles was another growing campaign by British workers for wage increases in defiance of the government's wage freeze policy.

Mr. Cripps had been expected early today, but his British overseas airways plane developed mechanical trouble at Glasgow, Scotland, and he was forced to switch to an overseas airways plane arriving late this afternoon.

China

Troops of the regular Communist armies have linked up with guerrillas in the area 100 miles north of Canton and are attacking at various points to probe Nationalist defenses, reliable reports said today.

Another report said horse-drawn artillery and ammunition wagons were being moved southward from Kanchow to join the fighting on the southern front.

Paris

France will be able to halt coal imports from the United States soon, her own production has increased so much, a spokesman said today.

He said that although French overseas coal production had dropped off, increase in output in metropolitan France would permit the halt in imports from the U. S. "in a few weeks."

Germany

Joseph Reimann, 23-year-old son of Western Germany's top Communist leader, said today he had disowned his father and had no intention of ever seeing him again.

Young Reimann, who fled a Russian police school in the Soviet zone and sought sanctuary in Western Germany, said he regarded the Marxist views of his father, Max Reimann, as "misguided."

"When I told him that I was badly treated as a prisoner of war in Russia, he told me that Russia was a young country and that there would be steady improvement," Reimann said.

Prague

The Czech news agency reported today that a member of the Catholic hierarchy apparently has switched allegiance from the Vatican to the government in the church-state dispute.

The agency said Frantisek Onderek, apostolic administrator of diocese in the Polish border region of Czechoslovakia, had approved a Communist bill putting the church under state control.

The board of bishops, of which Mr. Onderek is a member, on Aug. 14 sent a note to the government saying that many provisions of the proposed law were not acceptable. Mr. Onderek's signature was on it.

Private Plane Missing

On Washington flight

CAPE MAY, N. J., Sept. 17 (UP)—The Coast Guard began an air search today for a private plane missing on a flight from the Teterboro, N. J., airport to Washington, D. C., since yesterday afternoon. A Coast Guard official said the single-engine Howard plane was piloted by a man named "Rodgers."

Senate Group OK's \$1 Billion In Armed Aid

Committee Acts to Head Off 'Deliberate Russ Military Race'

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17 (UP)—A special Senate committee urged approval today for a \$1,314,010,000 military aid program to help rearm free nations against a "deliberate Russian arms race."

The combined Foreign Relations and Armed Services Committee recommended the program on a 22-3 vote as this nation's best bet in assuring the security of the Western world.

The Senate begins debate on the program Monday. The committee's report was issued as the foreign ministers of Western Europe met here to approve common defense plans.

Get Data on Russ

The report revealed that the Senators have received official information that Soviet ground forces are "in better condition than at any time since the war."

The committee told the Senate that Russia has increased by 19 per cent its present military budget over arms spending for 1948, and the Soviets now maintain more than 5 million men under arms. The Soviet garrison in Germany recently was increased from 70,000 to 100,000 men, the committee said.

All of this activity demonstrated that in the face of the complete demobilization of the forces of the United States and the European nations, and without a competing program of military improvement, the Soviet policy has been and is to increase its military strength," the committee said.

A Deliberate Policy

"This policy is apparently a deliberate one on the part of the Soviet government and would exist whether or not a program of aid to free nations is undertaken by the United States."

The committee also revealed that France will receive the lion's share of the \$1 billion of the military assistance program earmarked for Western Europe.

France, the report said, would provide the "hard core" of defense strength in this part of the world.

In this connection, it was recalled that Gen. Omar N. Bradley, chairman of the joint chiefs of staff, has said France will bear chief initial responsibility for ground operations in Europe.
