

Charles Reeve Rites to Be Tomorrow

Head of Ice Cream Company Dies At His Home Here

Services for Charles A. Reeve, president of the Ballard Ice Cream Co., will be held at 1:30 p.m. tomorrow in Flanner & Buchanan mortuary. Burial will be in Fairfield Friends Cemetery, west of Camby. He was 74.

Nationally-known in the industry, Mr. Reeve died Saturday in his home, 4626 Washington Blvd., after he and Mrs. Reeve returned from a visit with friends in Mooresville.

The Rev. Herbert Huffman of the First Friends Church will conduct services.

The son of John J. Reeve and Martha Mallard Reeve, Mr. Reeve was born in the Fairfield Quaker farm community southwest of Indianapolis. A graduate of the old Friends Central Academy, Plainfield, he was a 1900 graduate of Earlham College.

With Firm 45 Years

After brief employment in a Mooresville bank, he joined the Ballard Company here 45 years ago. He was manager of the firm several years during the illness of Hadley Ballard, its founder, then became president on incorporation in 1928.

A former member of the International Ice Cream Association's board of directors, he was one-time president of the Indiana Dairy Products Association and a member of numerous committees in the industry here.

He was a charter member of the Indianapolis Exchange Club, a director of A. J. Hueber Building and Loan Association, a trustee of Earlham College and a board member of Bertha Ballard Home Association for young women employed in Indianapolis. This was founded by Hadley Ballard in memory of his daughter.

Other Activities

He had served as board member of the Indianapolis Asylum for Friendless Colored Children and was former president of its directors. He also was a long-time member of the board of directors for Wheeler City Rescue Mission.

A life-long member of the Society of Friends, Mr. Reeve served on many committees of the First Friends Church here. He was a member of the financial board of Western Yearly Meeting of Friends. He was a member of the Columbus Club.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Katherine Osborne Reeve of Wilmington, O., whom he married in 1906; a sister, Mrs. Emma Reeve Kellum, Mooresville; and two nephews, Donald R. Kellum, Indianapolis, and Charles R. Kellum, Mooresville.

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Frank Morgan, Beloved Comedian, Dies in Sleep

Succumbs After 4 Decades of Fame

HOLLYWOOD, Sept. 19 — The movie industry and fans throughout the nation today mourned the death of Frank Morgan, beloved comedian whose sly chuckle and skillful double-talk carried him through nearly four decades of fame.

Mr. Morgan died in his sleep at his Beverly Hills mansion yesterday. He was 59. A doctor said death apparently resulted from a heart attack. His wife of 35 years, Alma, found him dead when she awoke at noon.

Mr. Morgan had spent Saturday evening at home, holding a quiet dinner party with his son George, 32, his wife and two house guests, and went to bed about 11.

Friends said his health had never appeared better. Recently he had taken up swimming in addition to his long-standing sport as a yachtsman.

The jovial hard-working actor had just finished a part in "Key to the City" at MGM, where he had been under contract since he came to Hollywood in 1933 and as a dramatic actor he won two nominations for Academy awards, for "The Affairs of Cellini" and "Tortilla Flat."

His marriage to the former Alma Muller, New York Socialite, was one of the happiest in Hollywood.
