

\$11,349 Tax Lien Against Minister

'Little David' Manager Tapped
County Recorder Paul Brewer today said a federal lien for \$11,349 in delinquent taxes has been filed against the Rev. Raymond G. Hoekstra, manager of "Little David Walker, 15-year-old evangelist."

The Indianapolis minister was recently involved in a Probate Court battle with Attorney James Dawson, over an accounting of \$67,000 in offerings collected at meetings which featured Little David, who claimed to have "spent five hours in heaven."

On several occasions, a federal agent attended sessions of the lengthy trial, and took notes as the preacher testified as to how he spent the money taken in at the boy evangelist's meetings.

The lien, Mr. Brewer said, did not set out the specific years covered in the government's claim for allegedly delinquent income taxes.

The second Fall Hoosier Historical Institute will visit the southern Indiana "Lincoln country," the city of Santa Claus and Angel Mounds on a two-day tour this week-end.

Open to the public, the tour will begin at 1 p. m. Saturday with assembly at the Lincoln Cabin site in Lincoln Park, Spencer County, and move to the Nancy Hanks grave and Abraham Lincoln Hall.

After a visit to Santa Claus the tour will make evening campfire at Lincoln Landing near Rockport, where the Hoosier Pioneer Village will be visited Sunday morning. The institute will close Sunday with a trip to Angel Mounds, the Indian burial grounds near Newburgh.

The tour will be conducted by Dr. Ross F. Lockridge, Hoosier historian. Special speaker will be Dr. Louis A. Warren, director of the Lincoln National Life Foundation in Ft. Wayne. Others on the program will be Mrs. Bess Ehrman, of Rockport, and Dr. Glenn A. Black, archaeologist.

Demonstrate TV Use in Surgery

Program Planned at IU Medical Center

The first Indiana demonstration of how television can be used to teach surgery will be presented here next week at the centennial convention of the Indiana State Medical Association.

Television facilities and a full television production staff will be brought here for daily broadcasts of operating and clinical procedures at the Indiana University Medical Center.

Programs Private

From the operating room programs will be sent by direct wire to television receivers located throughout the center. In addition, a microwave relay will beam programs on a special channel to the Mural Theater auditorium.

The programs will be private and only doctors can see them. Included in the \$100,000 worth of equipment are three TV cameras, relay transmitter and receiver, several 16-inch receivers and a "life size" screen.

Fifteen Hoosier-born or Hoosier-educated scientists will lecture during the four-day meeting, beginning Monday. Meetings will be held in the Athenaeum, the Mural Temple and the Indianapolis Athletic Club.

Parents Give Boy's Rifle to Deputies

Sheriff's deputies had a "new" rifle today from the parents of the teen-age owner after the youth and a companion admitted it was the weapon which accidentally wounded a man yesterday.

James B. Stone, 38, of 448 Bell St., was struck by a .22 caliber bullet while he worked in a field at the west edge of New Augusta. He was not injured seriously.

Investigators said the boys were target shooting near the field when the accident occurred. They were unable to determine which boy had fired the shot which wounded Mr. Stone. The youths were placed in custody of Juvenile Aid authorities.

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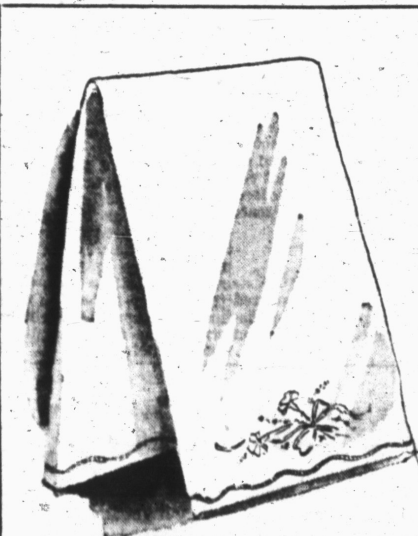

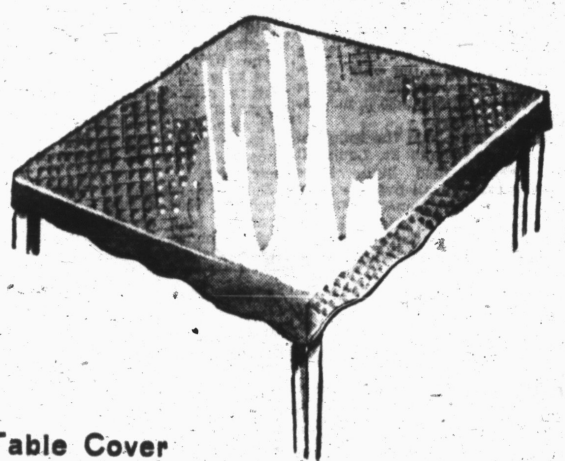

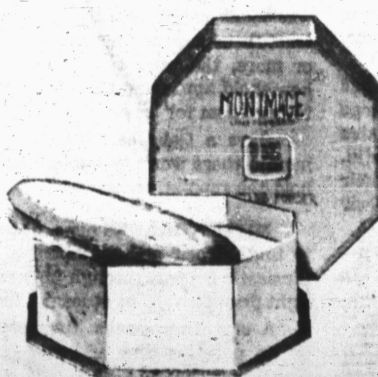
