Hoosier Doctors To Convene Here For Celebration

Hoosier physicians will lay their stethoscopes aside next week to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the Indiana State Medical Association here where the organization was founded.

Dr. J. Neill Garber, chairman of the convention committee, today said a full schedule of entertainment will await the practitioners during the four day meeting.

A golf tournament at Highland Country Club and a trap and skeet shoot sponsored by the Indiana Gun Club will be held Monday, and a buffet supper will be held Monday night in Murat Temple. Lectures and discussions will be held Tuesday morning and afternoon, but business will give way to a concert Tuesday night when the Baltimore and Ohio Glee Club will entertain doctors and their wives in the theater.

Delegates will be busy with more lectures and exhibits Wednesday to be followed by another musical program in the evening. Dr. Wilton M. Krogh, anthropologist from the University of Pennsylvania, will deliver a humorous lecture on "The Bones Speak of Murder."

The centennial banquet and ball at the Indiana Roof will climax the convention. Physicians who have practiced for 50 years will be recognized and a painting will be presented to the "General Practitioner of the Year." Kenneth McFarland, superintendent of Topeka, Kas. schools, will be the main speaker.

Dr. A. P. Hauss, New Albany, president of the state medical association, will preside at the dinner.

An Indianapolis resident for 35 years, she was a member of the First Baptist Church.

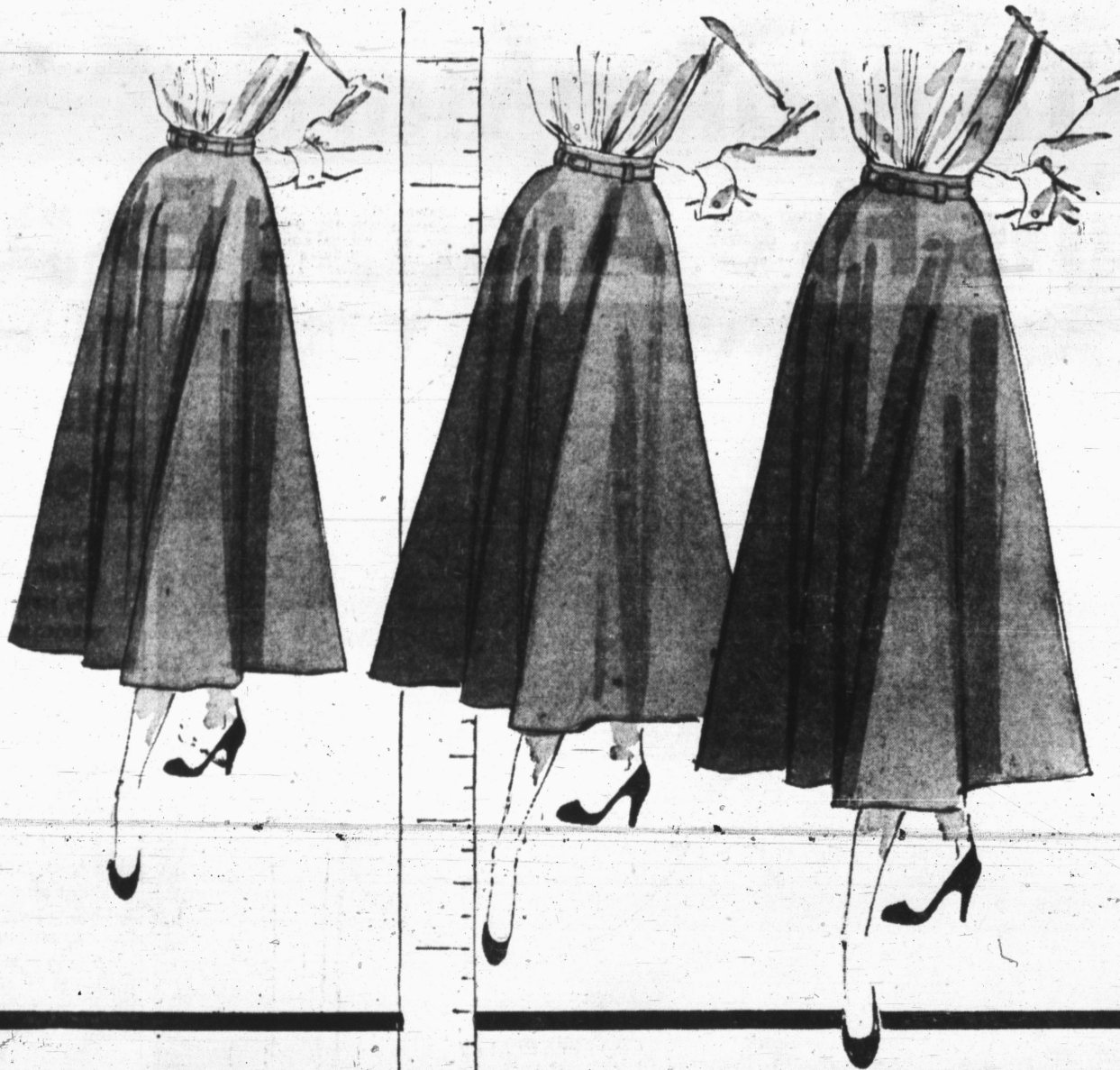
Cremation will follow services at 3 p. m. Sunday in Flanner & Buchanan mortuary. Her daughter is the only immediate survivor.

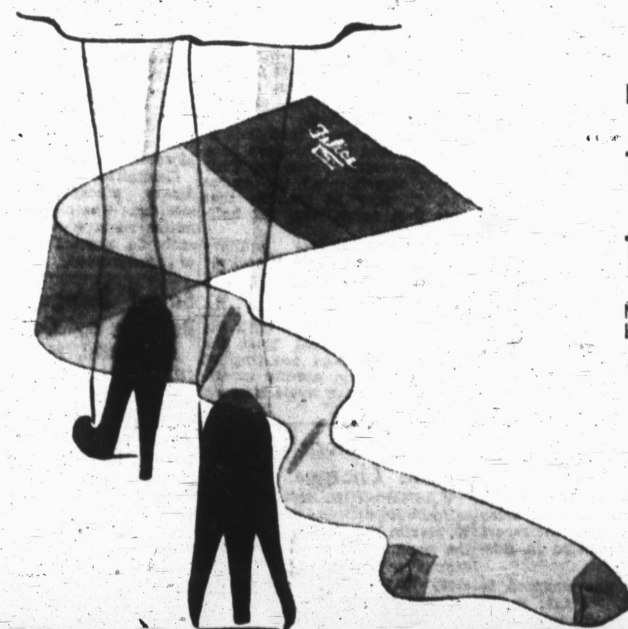
