Girl Missing Since She Left Home Aug. 16

A grief-stricken mother today sought help in locating a 16-year-old daughter who had been missing since Aug. 16 when she left to visit a sister in California. Ima Jane Pemberton, daughter of Mrs. Sarah Pemberton of 1549 Knox St., left Indianapolis last month supposedly en route to visit a sister, Mrs. Daisy Drummond at Redondo Beach, Calif.

Her mother says she never arrived in California, according to Ima Jane. The mother cannot recall the name of friends with whom her daughter left. Neither does she know the address of the friends. All she knows, according to Mrs. Clara Parker, also of 1549 Knox St., is that her daughter left with friends expecting to drive to California.

Friends Had Babies
The mother said the friends were young and had two babies. Ima Jane was supposedly assisting in caring for the children on the trip.

Mrs. Pemberton reported her daughter missing to Indianapolis Police several weeks ago but no trace has been found.

Ima Jane, sometimes known as "Janie" or "Jeannie" was described as being 16 but claiming to be 18, 5 feet 6 inches tall and weighing about 125 pounds. She wears a partial plate of front teeth which is said to be very noticeable.

Technically in Prison
The pair, theoretically in prison when they robbed Montgomery Ward store here last December, was indicted along with Mrs. Mary DaBagia, 36, employee of the store. Mrs. DaBagia, mother of the children, is charged as an accessory and will be arraigned Oct. 17.

Stumbaugh was sentenced in 1941 from Parke County to 15 years for auto banditry. He now must serve at least six years and eight months before becoming eligible for parole.

Gump, who received a one-to-10-year term in 1939 from Delaware County on grand larceny charges, was sentenced for the third time today. He was paroled in 1942, but since then has been convicted on a robbery charge and sentenced to 10-to-20 years.

Youth Re-enacts Statehouse Theft

Shows How He Got Auto Title Blanks

A 19-year-old youth remained in jail today under \$5000 bond after he re-enacted his Statehouse burglary which state officials said "couldn't have happened."

William Lamberson, Cambridge City, who confessed the theft of 61 blank car titles from the Statehouse in July, was taken back to demonstrate how he stole the papers after Secretary of State Charles Fleming said he doubted the confession.

Lamberson wriggled through a small space under the iron bars in a basement window and went directly to the filing cabinet in Room 107 from which he took the titles and a rubber stamp. He also described how he "cased" the robbery when he applied for his own car title.

Lamberson told police he intended to use the phony titles for resale of stolen cars. He had just purchased a special typewriter for printing perforations shortly before he was arrested Saturday night.

Seized Trailing Drunks
Lamberson and a companion, William Moore, 23, Straughn, were arrested as they trailed drunks. Police said they intended to hold them up to get driver's licenses. Both were carrying guns and were charged with violation of the Firearms Act.

Police also yesterday placed the same charge against Harry Langman, 41, 3636 N. Oxford St. Lamberson said Langman sold them the guns in his pawnshop at 25th St. and Martindale Ave.

Both men are scheduled in court Oct. 4. Lamberson is also being held for questioning by federal authorities for sale in Midwest of a car stolen in Indiana.

He also quoted Judge William M. Sparks, retired Chief Judge of the Seventh Federal Circuit Court, as having said of Mr. Minton:

"Judge Minton, though a Democrat, had at no time discussed the political issue or complexion of any case before the court, nor the political faith of the parties, and that Judge Minton never shirked his responsibility and was diligent, honest, and industrious in his application of the law."

Sen. Lucas said there was no question but that Judge Minton was "a liberal and progressive."
