Your Job—**What to Do
To Become CPA****Candidates Must
Meet State Regulation**

What would I have to do to become a C.P.A.? I am 28 years old, have had six years of book-keeping experience, but am only a high school graduate. How can I qualify?

All candidates for the C.P.A. degree in Indiana must meet certain standards which are required by the State Board of Certified Accountants of Indiana.

The examination questions are based on four subjects, namely, Auditing, Commercial Law, Accounting Theory and Accounting Practice.

Application to take the examination should be filed with the board at least 30 days prior to the examination dates and the examination fee is \$25. Examinations are held in May and November of each year.

An applicant for examination for a certificate to practice as a Certified Public Accountant must be at least 21 years of age, a resident of the state of Indiana for at least one year immediately prior to date of the application, a high school graduate or have had the equivalent of such an education, of good moral character, a citizen of the United States or have declared his intention of becoming such citizen, and must have had three years' experience in the practice of accounting, including two years as a public accountant or as an employee of an independent public accountant.

HOLLYWOOD, Sept. 27 (UPI)—Film Star Deanna Durbin asked superior court today for a divorce from Writer-Producer Felix Jackson, charging her 47-year-old husband with extreme cruelty and desertion.

The 27-year-old former child star, separated from Mr. Jackson for two years, said in a suit filed yesterday that a settlement had been reached under which she receives custody of their daughter, Jessica, 3.

Miss Durbin said at the time of their separation that they were together so much at home and at work they got on each other's nerves.

THE COUPLE married June 13, 1945, in Las Vegas, Nev., and separated Jan. 6, 1947. Miss Durbin formerly was married to Film Producer Vaughn Paul.

Mr. Jackson, who has been married four times, was responsible for many of Miss Durbin's successes, both as a writer and producer.
