Students Will Have Opportunity to Learn Procedure

Shortridge High School students will have an opportunity to learn radio procedure when the new radio work shop, now under construction, is ready for classes in January.

Much of the equipment has already arrived, according to H. H. Siemer, physics teacher and technical advisor for the shop. The set-up will contain a sound-proof studio, control room and audience observation room.

Students doing script writing, music appreciation studies and voice auditions will have first use of the shop until regular classes can be scheduled by Miss Florence Guild, head of the English department.

Butler Sets Date for Bids

Plan New \$700,000 Pharmacy Building

Butler University officials today set next Thursday as the date for opening of bids on the school's new \$700,000 College of Pharmacy building.

Plans for the three-story structure were completed last summer by Robert Frost Daggett & Associates, architects. To be located approximately 300 feet to the north of Jordan Hall, it will be the first building erected on the north side of the classroom quadrangle.

The unit will enable the College of Pharmacy to move from its present location at 802 E. Market St. to the Fairview campus.

Bids will be opened at 10:30 a.m. in Room 162, Jordan Hall. Construction will begin immediately if overall costs are within a price range established by the board of directors.

State Highway Detours Listed

The list of detours on Indiana highways stands at 14, with no additions during the last week, the State Highway Commission reported today.

Highway improvements were started at four places, but traffic is being maintained. Under this heading is Ind. 37 south of Bedford in two places, U.S. 41 in Sullivan County, and Ind. 66 from Tell City through Cannelton.

Roads actually closed because of construction are:

Ind. 12—Closed to traffic over 2 tons at several places in Marion County; 12 miles over roads 22, 303, and 18 (weak bridges).

Ind. 22—Closed to traffic over 2 tons in Cass County; 5 miles over county gravel (weak bridge).

Ind. 22—Closed to traffic over 2 tons at south edge of Pennsylvia; detour 22 miles over roads 303, 18 and county gravel (weak bridge).

Ind. 22—Bridge damaged by truck 1 ton over 22 miles in Marion County; detour 12 miles over roads 22 and 28.

Ind. 22—Second Street Bridge in Columbus, Marion County, closed to traffic over roads 22, 31, 31-A (weak bridge) to Seymour detour over 17, 31, and 30 (repairing bridge).

Ind. 22—From Marion north to 204 miles over 61, 41 and 36 (weak roads and bridge construction).

Ind. 22—From Frankfort north to Ind. 22—2 miles over Roads 39 and 26 (detour 2 miles over county gravel).

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
