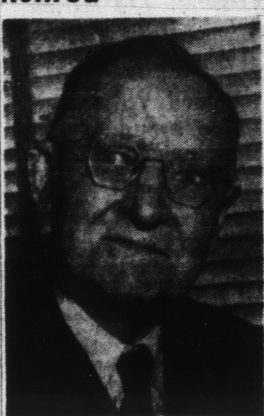

Dinner Meeting Set for Friday

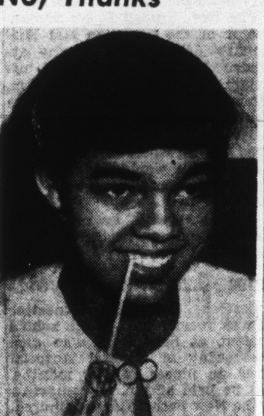
