The patrolman had started clerking in a liquor store during off-duty hours.

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

Mrs. Raisin does not know all this festivity is planned in her honor. She is to be "surprised." The churchwomen are sure that "it will work out." For Mrs. Raisin will be very busy with Sunday school and worship and will not see the newspaper until later.

The small, slender woman, known for her good works, gave the ground on which the Fleming Garden Church stands and became a charter member. Her friends say she follows to the letter this command in Matthew 6:3.

Aided Those In Need

Such information has a way of escaping somehow. It has become known that Mrs. Raisin made it possible for three families to own their homes by advancing down payments on the properties for them. She sold a complete house and lot to another couple without requiring a down payment.

Friends explain that this churchwoman believes that her possessions really belong to God and that she merely is steward of them. God has directed her investigations and that is why she is successful with them, Mrs. Raisin insists.

Circumstances prevented her from becoming a missionary in her youth. But she gets a vicarious pleasure now from helping with the church scholarship fund for young people in Bible college. An evangelist now is holding meetings in the Northwest financed by a loan from the churchwoman.

Sprightly, eager, with keen dark eyes looking through her spectacles, she is described as popular with young people as well as adults. "And she gets around among us," was the comment of Mrs. Madonna Andre, leader of the church prayer and Bible study group.

Gives Them A Lift
"Whatever work we are doing when Mrs. Raisin comes into our houses she gives us a lift," said Mrs. Andre. "And before she leaves she's sure to run in some remarks about the Bible and the Christian life. She's known for her beautiful prayers said in our group. She takes care of three foster grandchildren while her foster daughter, Mrs. Bonita Woodward, works.

The congregation and Mrs. Raisin tomorrow will attend services at 10:30 a.m. when their pastor, the Rev. Jess W. Johnson, will preach. The Rev. W. F. Mathis, minister of the Fountain Square Christian Church, will give the homecoming address at 2 p.m. The choir will sing "The Sweetest Story," directed by Miss Margaret Shoff.
