Sell \$1,093,000 Of Lyons' Estate

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., Oct. 4 (UP)—A portion of the estate left by Robert W. Lyons, Indiana, Washington and St. Petersburg attorney, was sold for a total of \$1,093,000, court sources said today.

Mr. Lyons' will, which left his entire estate to his widow, Mrs. Alma Lyons, has not been probated. His son, John B. Lyons, is in Washington handling legal matters in connection with the will.

Holdings of Coronado, Inc., builders and developers of Bahamas beach here, in which Lyons was the majority stockholder, were liquidated partially at a total of more than \$1,000,000. Several houses in the exclusive resort development and more than 80 lots were sold for a total of \$241,300. Seven completed houses were sold for \$152,000, and the Bahamas Shores Yacht Club and hotel were sold for \$700,000 to Byron Kuth and Associates, Kuth is a former Cleveland, O., attorney now located here.

Driver Wonders Why Spend Money On Unspent Time?

"WHY SHOULD a man pay for parking in advance when he doesn't know how long he's going to be parked?"

A. R. Webb, of 2320 E. 12th St., presented that perplexing question today after he had received a ticket for violating parking regulation at one of the downtown meters.

Mr. Webb, who said he was a church layman and had conducted Sunday services in the County Jail, insisted he "paid the meter" after he had been in a bank. The policeman, however, insisted the meter "should have been paid" when Mr. Webb parked.

"I wasn't going to be there long," Mr. Webb insisted. "I could see no reason to jump out of my car, turn a crank and pay for a whole hour when I didn't intend to be gone more than 15 minutes."

"THE METER says 'one hour parking, five cents' and it doesn't say anything about when the money has to be paid."

Mr. Webb said he had been perfectly willing to "pay that meter" when he came out but still doesn't know why he should pay in advance.

"A man never knows how long he's going to be gone," he insisted.

The \$2 Mr. Webb will have to mail to police headquarters is not an "advance" payment. It's a penalty for not paying in advance.

Meters are like that.

Park Board Asks Jurisdiction Shift

Requests Repair Of North, East Streets

The Park Department today asked that the Works Board assume jurisdiction of nine North and East Side streets in the park boulevard system for repair and general maintenance work.

The move was another step in the program under which the boards plan to combine resources for the maintenance of city streets and boulevards.

Mayor Feeney said that if the transfer was made, the Works Board would have the streets repaired but would bill the Park Board for the service. The boards operate on separate budgets.

The streets named in the transfer request today were: Clarendon Rd. from 38th St. to Hampton Dr.; Hampton Dr. from Clarendon Rd. to Sunset Ave.; Sunset Ave. from Hampton Dr. to 49th St.; 49th St. from Sunset Ave. to Boulevard Pl.; Boulevard Pl. from 49th to 52d St.; 52d St. from Boulevard Pl. to Westfield Blvd.; Sheridan Ave. from 9th to 10th St.; Ewing St. from Washington St. to Sherman Dr.; and Riverside Dr. from 58th and Illinois Sts. to College Ave.

Red China Seeks Nod From U. S.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4 (UP)—The State Department announced today it has received from the Chinese Communist regime a bid for U. S. recognition. But a spokesman said the United States "sees absolutely no need for any haste whatsoever."

Department spokesman Lincoln White said the Communists sent what appeared to be a printed form letter to U. S. Consul General O. Edmund Clubb in Peiping. The letter was signed by the No. 2 Chinese Communist Chou En-lai.

Mr. White said that, as far as he knew, this government has no plans even to acknowledge, much less to reply, to Chou En-lai's letter.

Asked if it was under study by the State Department, Mr. White replied, "It is being read."

Senate Committee Rejects Olds

7-0 Vote Cast Against Nomination

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4 (UP)—A Senate Commerce Committee voted unanimously today to recommend that the Senate reject the nomination of Leland Olds for a third five-year term on the Federal Power Commission.

Subcommittee Chairman Lyndon B. Johnson (D. Tex.) announced that the group—four Democrats and three Republicans—had voted 7 to 0 to report the appointment unfavorably to the full committee.

Inasmuch as the subcommittee is a majority of the full Commerce Committee, the unanimous vote insured that the full committee would disapprove the nomination. Administration leaders privately are conceding that the Senate will follow suit and reject the nomination.

"I don't believe that any Senator who could have heard the testimony on his writings on his work would vote for his confirmation," Mr. Johnson told reporters.

Besides Mr. Johnson, the subcommittee included Chairman Edwin C. John (D. Colo.) of the full committee and Sens. Ernest W. McFarland (D. Ariz.), Herbert R. O'Connor (D. Md.), Clyde M. Reed (R. Kas.), John W. Bricker (R. O.) and Homer Capehart (R. Ind.).

President Truman nominated Mr. Olds for a third five-year term on the commission last summer.

Opponents have charged that Mr. Olds is a foe of free enterprise and an advocate of planned economy. His supporters have contended that he is just an old-fashioned "liberal."

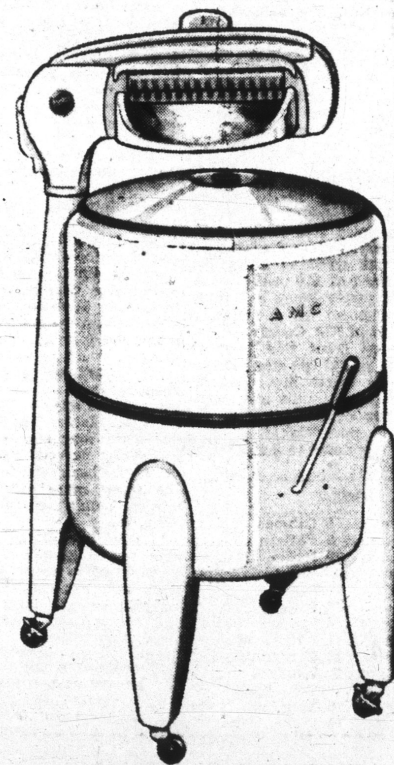
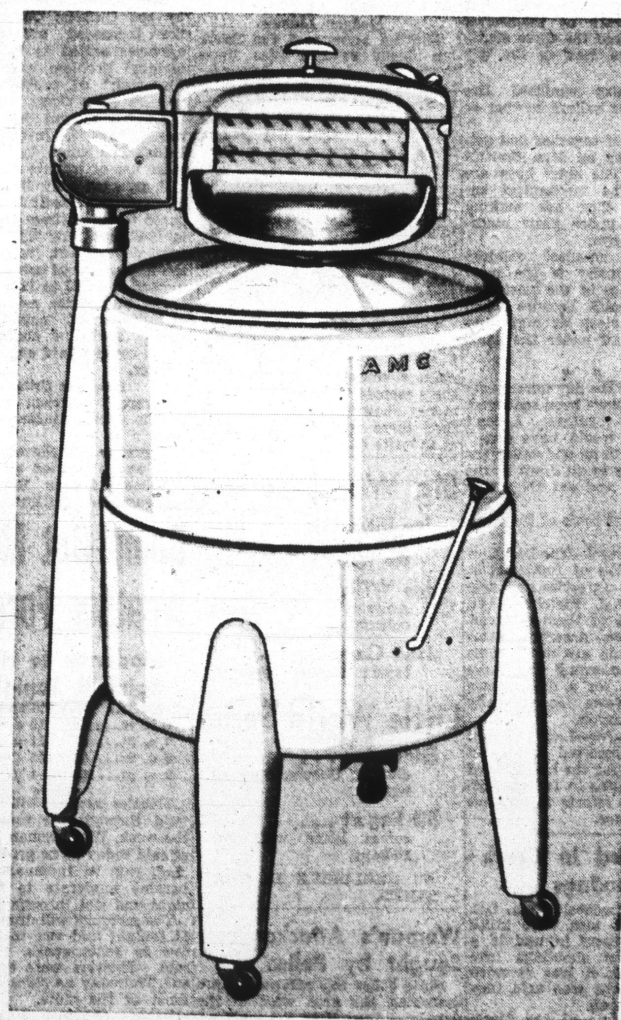
