Services for George Buck, "grand old man" of Indianapolis high school education and principal of Shortridge High School from 1910 to 1941, who died yesterday in his home, 5353 College Ave., will be held at 1:30 p. m. tomorrow in Flanner & Buchanan Mortuary.

The Rev. William A. Shullenberger, pastor of the Central Christian Church, and the Rev. Henry G. White, pastor of the Irvington Methodist Church, will conduct the services. Burial will be in Washington Park Mausoleum.

Born in Cincinnati, O., Mr. Buck began teaching at the age of 17 in a one-room school house in Ohio. When he retired in 1941, he had served 31 years as principal of Shortridge. He was 83.

Charles E. Jones Dead in Muncie

MUNCIE, Oct. 7.—Charles E. Jones, circuit court bailiff and former Muncie chief of detectives, suffered a heart attack and died Wednesday night. He was 67.

Mr. Jones retired from the police force in 1947, after serving as day captain and detective chief in the administration of the late Mayor Ira Wilson. He also was deputy sheriff in 1929 under Harry Macaulay.

Active in Republican politics, Mr. Jones was a lifelong resident of Delaware County. He was a member of the Fraternal Order of Police and the Moose Lodge.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Tina Jones; a stepson, Elmer Coats; four brothers, Fred, Merrill, Arthur and William Jones, all of Muncie; a sister, Mrs. Lela Finnerty, Indianapolis, and two stepgrandchildren.

Bank Teller Won't Tell What He Did With \$9000

LAS VEGAS, Nev., Oct. 7 (UP)—Bank Teller Stanley William Omdahl today refused to explain what he did with more than \$9000 he allegedly embezzled from a Brooklyn, N. Y., savings bank. Omdahl was arrested here yesterday after his wife notified the bank that he left her Sept. 22, giving her \$500 for care of their child. He had only \$5.20 in his possession.

Federal agents said Omdahl's wife was surprised at his sudden wealth. An audit of accounts revealed the shortage. Authorities said Omdahl would be held as a fugitive for arraignment before U. S. Commissioner A. G. Blad.
