—Jake Horner, one of two survivors of Gen. Custer's command, admitted today that "my time is running out."

Mr. Horner celebrated his 95th birthday yesterday. He told again how he survived the battle of the Little Big Horn, where Gen. George Custer and five companies of the 7th Cavalry were wiped out, simply because he didn't have a horse to ride into combat.

Still straight and wiry, Mr. Horner said he hasn't had "an ache or pain in years," but acknowledged that he hasn't many years left.

Hutson Confers On Coal Supplies

Public Institutions To Get Priority

State Labor Commissioner Thomas R. Hutson left today for a conference with officials of the United Mine Workers Union in Terre Haute in an effort to obtain a list of surplus coal stockpiles.

He said the coal will be sent to public institutions in critical states and towns.

Urge Immediate Purchase

The State Labor Commissioner said that he had advised Dr. Charles Myers, director of Indianapolis General Hospital, to purchase 100 tons of coal immediately. The hospital, with a fuel supply left for 10 days, notified state officials that coal was available for purchase from a nearby stockpile.

Yesterday, Gov. Schricker appointed a three-man committee to co-ordinate the distribution of surplus coal above the ground to public institutions in short supply.

The Governor named Mr. Hutson chairman of the committee and Harry Geisel, former big league baseball umpire, and Reginald Sullivan, former Indianapolis mayor, as members.

The committee will meet tomorrow or Monday, Mr. Hutson said.

Firemen Battle Oats Blaze in Grain Tower

Firemen using five pieces of equipment from Beech Grove, Warren Township and Indianapolis stations today were battling a stubborn, smoldering fire in 8000 bushels of oats in a plant of the Cleveland Grain Co., 4200 E. Bethel Ave., Beech Grove.

No water was available and the firemen were attempting to extinguish the fire with chemicals. The oats were in a concrete bleaching tower, and at noon workmen were cutting a hole through a wall to get chemicals on the fire.

Symphony Orchestra Plans Riley Tribute

Program for the first pair of subscription concerts in the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra's 20th season to be held Nov. 12 and 13 in the Murat Theater will be a tribute to James Whitcomb Riley.

Now in his 13th year as director of the orchestra, Fabien Sevitzky has selected Prelude and Fugue in F Minor by Bach-Zadot, Waltz Suite by Dohnanyi and Tchaikovsky's Symphony No. 4 for the opening concerts.

Unruh Declared Insane In Massacre of 13

CAMDEN, N. J., Oct. 7 (UP)—Howard B. Unruh, who massacred 13 persons here Sept. 6, has been found insane and will not stand trial, Camden County Prosecutor Mitchell Cohen announced today.

Mr. Cohen said that four psychiatrists who have been examining the 28-year-old killer at the New Jersey state hospital in Trenton for the past month, found Unruh to be a "case of dementia praecox, mixed type with pronounced catatonic and paranoid coloring."

Sen. William Jenner Pays Riley Tribute On His 100th Anniversary

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7—James Whitcomb Riley's 100th anniversary was observed here today by the Senate and the Congressional Library.

Sen. William E. Jenner (R. Ind.) paid tribute to the Hoosier Poet in the Senate and the library placed in original copies of Riley letters and poems. The display includes a first edition of "The Old Swimmers Hole" and "Leaven Other Poems" published in Indianapolis in 1883.

"Indiana, rich in literary tradition, joins with her sister states today in paying tribute to one of her most distinguished penmen," Sen. Jenner said.

The occasion is the 100th anniversary of the birth of James Whitcomb Riley, alternately known as the Hoosier Poet and the Children's Poet.

"Though James Whitcomb Riley

is but one of the host of honored folk more than did this poet

Hoosier state in either quality or quantity of its excellent literature.

Such names as Gen. Lew Wallace, Booth Tarkington, George Ade, Meredith Nicholson, Edward Everett Eggleston, Theodore Dreiser, Albert J. Beveridge, Sarah T. Bolton and a host of others fill the pages of literature along with that of Riley.

"A journalistic 'Who's Who' would be filled for the greater part with the names of Hoosiers who have become famous in the adult.

At still another place, a fitting and lasting monument to the Children's Poet will there be joy today. That is the James Whitcomb Riley Hospital for Children at Indianapolis, where, thanks to Riley and medical science, many a "happy little cripple" is walking again today.


