The Brookside Mothers' Civic Club is responsible for making the Brookside Community House a magnet for the entire neighborhood.

And for helping hundreds of boys and girls feel at home on anybody's dance floor.

Organized in 1934, the club annually plans an activities program for the welfare of its children and in the interest of the community.

Some 48 pre-school tots are enrolled in the rhythm band which holds "swing" sessions the first Thursday of each month.

Meanwhile, their resourceful mothers "cook up" more plans in the monthly club business session. Just preceding there is a covered-dish luncheon.

Present "Spring Review"

Over 250 boys and girls are enrolled in this year's dancing classes—tap, ballet and ballroom—which meet each Thursday. The four-year-olds begin their tap lessons at 2:30 p. m.

Older children learn in succeeding classes. By 6 p. m. the seventh and eighth graders have gathered for their hour class in ballroom instruction.

Dancing becomes really very simple and so much fun under the trained eye of the youthful teacher, Miss Barbara Willoughby, Manual High School senior.

Mrs. Leo Madden, pianist, provides the music and mothers assist at the door, so the youngsters get into the proper class at the designated time.

Classes practice at fever pitch and mothers sew with flying needles once a year for the "Spring Review," a gala event in costume.

Adults Dance, Too

Club members also act as check-girls for the Melody Manor teen-age dances and ac-

tivities on Friday nights in the community house. On the second Thursday night of each month their husbands join them for round and square dancing from 8 to 11 p. m.

The next adult party will be Thursday.

Boys from seven to 11 find opportunity to work off some excess energy in the gym classes. The first one will be Wednesday with a teacher from the Indiana University Normal College of the American Gymnastic Union.

The mother's club also has a full schedule of special events during the year—a welcome and party for new members in the
