## Grill Suspect in Attack on Woman

### May Face Victim of County Assault

A suspect in the rape of a young farmwife in the western section of Marion County last Tuesday was being questioned by Indianapolis detectives today.

A man found sleeping beneath a railroad bridge near the Capital Packing Co., 801 Kentucky Ave., was said by police to answer the description of the man who bound, gagged and attacked the young mother after threatening to knife her baby.

Served 10 Days

Police revealed the suspect had been released from jail early Tuesday morning after serving a 10-day vagrancy sentence. Detectives were to question him today to determine if he should be taken before the victim for possible identification.

He was arrested after Orville Shoemaker, of 5048 Harbison Ave., night watchman at the packing company, told police he had been hanging around the bridge for several hours as if watching for a freight train.

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## Pupils Use Voting Machine To Elect Class Officers

### Shortridge Juniors Employ 'Adult' Method to Select Their Leaders

Juniors at Shortridge High School today were busy congratulating their new class officers.

But they may one day find that the most important thing about yesterday's election was not who won but how the officers were elected.

Instead of marking their choices on ballots and dropping the ballots into boxes, the juniors made good use of a mechanism they will face many times after they reach maturity—a real, honest-to-goodness voting machine.

And they used the machine like veterans, according to Edwin W. Lingenfelter, custodian of Marion County voting machines, who set this one up for use at Shortridge yesterday.

"They were only in the booth for 45 to 70 seconds apiece," Mr. Lingenfelter said. "That's as good an average as we have in city elections."

**Trained in Use**  
The students' skill was due to a couple of days devoted to training them by Mrs. Nell Thomas, junior class sponsor and English teacher, who also works in the guidance department.

She was present yesterday as Joan Morgan, general voting

chairman, and her assistant, Lynne Adams, kept the juniors moving into the booth from 10:30 a.m. until the polls closed at 4 p.m.

"Almost 300 votes were cast for the officers from a slate of 45 candidates. Final election results were:

Ward Walker, president; Joan Burns, vice president; Beverly Lewis, secretary; Bill Arbaugh, treasurer; Mickey Mead, vaudeville chairman, and Sue Ziegler, program director.

Extra importance is attached to the junior election results because junior officers are responsible for staging the annual vaudeville show at Shortridge. The show last year grossed over \$10,000.

Joel Hadley, Shortridge principal, said he thought use of the voting machine was "a grand idea."

"We want our young people to be so accustomed to the voting machine," Mr. Hadley said, "that they will be thoroughly informed in its use when they go into the booth as adults."

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
