Champion to Be Selected Tomorrow

International dairy cattle show judging in two breeds began today at the first International Dairy Exposition in the State Fairgrounds.

The top cattle in the Jersey and Guernsey breeds were entered in the judging. Champions will be determined tomorrow.

At 1 p. m. today the milking derby was scheduled to start and to continue at 8 p. m. Breeds participating were Jersey, Brown Swiss, Guernsey, Jersey, Holstein-Friesian, Milking Shorthorn and Red Poll.

Other highlights of the day's program were to be the H. P. Wasson & Co. style show at 3:15 p. m., Jimmy Lynch Death Dodge at 4 p. m., the 4-H Club and Future Farmers of America award banquet at 6 p. m.

The bull was declared international grand champion as well as grand champion and senior champion.

Redvue Bud, owned by Roy L. Mueller, Arlington, Minn., was named reserve grand champion in the Red Poll judging, first of seven breeds of cattle to be judged in competition.

Top junior champion honors went to "Midway Bandolier," a bull owned by John Schmiesing & Son of Ft. Laramie, O.
