Giants Make Comeback After Early Season Losses Iron Out 'Bugs'

Mentors Find Hard Work in Practice Pays Off on Scoreboard, Morale

Things are beginning to even up out at Ben Davis because things are beginning to add up.

Coach Lou Parnell, who roamed the European recreational frontier last summer, came back to his new job this fall after six years at Park School. He shook hands with another new assistant coach, John Masariu, fresh out of Butler, who's no stranger to the neighborhood recreational problems of boys.

And then they went to work. You couldn't tell it for a while because the Giants dropped two close squeakers out of three and succumbed to Southport, a rival county power.

Parnell and Masariu, who can whistle while they work, found out the panacea for the Giants' ills. They drilled on fundamentals, an apparent necessity handicapping high school gridgers in the state the last two years because of no spring drills. They drilled until they could notice the results on the scoreboard.

Ben Davis tripped little Pike Township, 32 to 6, two weeks ago and became the third county team in a row to hang the black crepe on Speedway's defending champions. The score was 20 to 15. The Plugs aren't flat on their backs, but their wholesale injuries haven't helped matters.

Burkhardt Improved Also

The Giants were coming into their own and one of the boys who also found himself in Halfback Glen Burkhardt, who has scored five touchdowns in the last two games. He had been hurt in an accident.

Coach Parnell's praise doesn't slow down until he gets down to his third stringers, and then he has to sidestep because "I've got some promising young ones coming up."

That answered the query about all those 18 seniors he has almost blanketing the first starting eleven. Sophomore Dave Marksberry, a 175-pounder, and Junior Jack Moore, a 150-pound quarterback, are the only underclassmen starters, usually. The Giant mentor struck a happy balance between continued development of this rich inheritance of seniors and his next year's hopefuls.

Seniors Dale Morgan and Bob Hoeger man the flanks; senior Jim Moore, no relation to Jack, has the other tackle spot; Jim Campbell and Pat Pinkston are at guards for the last year, and Center Dave Henderson hopes to graduate, too.

Clayton Carmichael, at fullback; Bill Ping at right halfback and Burkhardt are eligible for the sheepskin. Coming back to

Coach Glenn Harnesman said today there would be a few changes in the starting lineup for the homecoming tilt. In the backfield a possible starting combination is Dan McLaren, Indianapolis, at quarterback; Jim Swope, also of Indianapolis and Chuck Gainer, Danville, Ill., at halfbacks, and Norm Buktenica, Chicago, at fullback.

Rough Riders Top State List

E. Chicago Roosevelt Picked Over Reitz

East Chicago Roosevelt's perennially powerful Rough Riders today were back in the spot they occupied from 1946 until 1948, leading the elite of Indiana's high school football parade.

Coach Pete Rucinski's Riders, unbeaten in five games, were tops in the first weekly United Press statewide rankings, resuming their three-year monopoly which was broken last year.

The Rough Riders gained the nod by virtue of their 20-to-12 victory over Evansville Reitz, a coholder of the mythical title last year. The Panthers from the Pocket City were in the runner-up spot with three victories opposing that loss.

The remainder of the "Big Ten" was dominated by northern Indiana schools, but third place belonged to the high-flying New Castle Trojans of the North Central Conference. The Trojans haven't missed in five games and have a good chance for an unbeaten season.

South Bend Team Next

South Bend Washington, leading the eastern division of the Northern Indiana Conference, edged East Chicago Washington for the fourth place, and South Bend Central was sixth, followed by independent Gary Roosevelt, Evansville Central, rugged Michigan City and South Bend Riley.

Several "crucial" games this week-end will put the front runners on the spot. Gary Roosevelt, for instance, takes its perfect record to South Bend Central. South Bend Washington exposes its clean slate at La Porte in a Northern loop tilt, and Bloomington hosts Evansville Reitz in the top downstate clash.

Other headliners included Columbus at Connersville, a tussle which may decide the South Central Conference championship, with the Columbus Bulldogs the defending champions. Auburn and Columbia City, both unbeaten, settle an issue in a Northeastern Conference fracas.

East Chicago Roosevelt, meanwhile, takes on Chicago Harrison, and New Castle shouldn't be troubled at Frankfort.
