

## 200 Police Hunt 8 Armed Escapees

### Four-State Search Launched for Convicts

WILMINGTON, Del., Oct. 27 (UP)—More than 200 state police were ordered into a four-state manhunt today for eight escaped convicts. The heavily armed convicts were led by two life term murderers.

The desperadoes were reported to have 10 revolvers and two rifles they took from the prison arsenal in a break from the New Castle County jail last night.

The convicts first cut all telephone wires. Then overpowered four guards, used their keys to open the prison arsenal and took two guards as hostages to get outside the gates.

Tower guards spotted the group crossing the prison yard but they could not fire for fear of hitting the guards.

The prisoners hurled themselves against the gate until it burst open. On an adjoining farm they told the two guards to "get going." Then they scaled a wall and fled across a field and disappeared as tower guards opened fire with machine guns.

## Guard Mystery Woman in Slaying

LONDON, Oct. 27 (UP)—Scotland Yard probing the "airplane ride" of a British used car dealer, was reported today to have a mysterious blond woman under guard. She was reported under protection as Scotland Yard pushed its hunt for the slayers of Stanley Setty, 44, an Iraqi by birth.

Mr. Setty, a familiar night club figure often seen with beautiful women, was stabbed seven times in the chest. His headless and legless torso apparently was tossed from an airplane flying over England. The torso was found near Tillingham last Friday.

Authorities were reported to believe the blond was marked for death by Mr. Setty's killers because she knew too much.

## Jacobs to Back Richardson For Virgin Islands Post

### Plans to Confer With Democratic Chairman; Truman May Appoint Native Governor

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27 (UP)—Rep. Andrew Jacobs, Indianapolis Democrat, expects to confer shortly with Democratic National Chairman William M. Boyle Jr., in an effort to have Henry Richardson Jr., Indianapolis attorney, appointed governor of the Virgin Islands.

"I already have written the chairman regarding the Richardson appointment and expect to confer with him in the matter," Mr. Jacobs said today. "If necessary, I also may take up the appointment directly with the White House."

Mr. Richardson is an outstanding Negro lawyer and one-time Democrat member of the Indiana Legislature. If appointed, he would succeed Gov. William Hastie, first Negro appointed to the U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals. Judge Hastie's appointment was reported to the Senate at the same time as that of H. Nathan Swaim of Indianapolis and 23 other new judgeships. All will serve in the interim until the Senate returns to act on their confirmation.

## Injunction Bars 2d Chiropractor

### Beech Grove Practitioner Cited

A temporary injunction against Robert W. Tisen, Beech Grove chiropractor, was granted today by Circuit Court Judge Lloyd D. Claycombe.

Mr. Tisen was the second Marion County "drugless" doctor to be enjoined from practicing as the result of Attorney General J. Emmett McManamon's campaign against unlicensed practitioners.

In an effort to prove discrimination against chiropractors in the state, George G. Rinier and Lewis Marine, retained by the International Chiropractors' Association, called to the stand a member of the State Board of Medical Examiners.

The witness, Dr. W. Niles Wishard Jr., who testified he was a state board member for three years, admitted he "knew nothing of chiropractic work." The doctor said his knowledge on the subject was "purely hearsay."

"No Questionnaire" Dr. Wishard, a graduate of the Harvard Medical School, testified that during his membership on the board no questionnaire had been prepared by the board for persons seeking to qualify as chiropractors.

Defense attorneys contend the state is making an effort to drive chiropractors out of the state. They charged the practice is permitted in 46 other states and recognized as a definite profession. Records indicate there has been no chiropractic licenses issued in Indiana since 1927.

## Local Man Admits Burglaries, Forgery

MINNEAPOLIS, Oct. 27 (UP)—An Indianapolis man, arrested here for carrying two guns in a paper bag, has confessed two burglaries in Milwaukee and a forgery in Detroit, police said today.

He first identified himself as Walter Lundy of Detroit, then as Benjamin L. Bococh of Indianapolis. He said he formerly operated a dry cleaning establishment in Indianapolis.

Bococh was arrested while displaying two guns he had taken from a paper bag in the washroom of a bar. Police said they found another gun in his room.

Bococh told police he stole the three pistols in one of the Milwaukee burglaries.

## 2 Local Women Seriously Injured as Car Overturns

### Two Men Killed in Other State Crashes; Fifteen More Arrested in Traffic Drive

Two Indianapolis women were seriously injured and two men died in three traffic accidents reported in the state in the last 24 hours.

In the city, 19 accidents resulted in nine injured, none seriously, police reported.

One motorist was arrested for drunken driving as police continued their traffic crackdown. Eight others were arrested for speeding and six for reckless driving.

A 9-year-old girl, Sue Carroll Roberts, 2178 1/2 N. Capitol Ave., received a broken leg and head injuries when she was struck by a car driven by Virgil S. Killmer, 24, of 3408 E. 26th St. at the intersection of 22d St. and Capitol Ave. yesterday.

In a serious condition in St. Elizabeth Hospital, Lafayette, today were Miss Mary Anne Brusko, 26, of 1434 N. New Jersey St., and her companion, Miss Bernadette Mullen, 20, 1318 E. Kelly St.

The two young women were injured en route to Chicago when their car driven by Miss Brusko swerved off U. S. 52 near Lafayette, overturned four times and struck a culvert.

State police reported both were thrown clear of the wreckage. Miss Brusko is a laboratory technician in St. Francis Hospital, Beech Grove.

Roscoe Eckrodt, 43, of Ft. Wayne, died of a broken neck when the car he was driving went off a county road three miles north of Berne, Ind., police reported.

A Laconia, Ind., man died in St. Anthony's Hospital, New Albany, following a head-on auto-truck collision two miles west of New Albany on Ind. 62.

The victim was Leo J. McKim, 24, the driver of the car. The truck driver, John S. Davis of DePauw, Ind., received only minor injuries.
