**Capt. Ruckelshaus Reburied in Indiana**

**Air Force Officer Killed in India Crash**

Capt. Thomas F. Ruckelshaus came home to Indiana soil yesterday.

The Air Force officer killed in a World War II airplane crash in India was reburied in the National Cemetery at New Albany, his family announced.

The body of the former Red Cab Co. president, sportsman and former Notre Dame football luminary and other members of the plane crew were exhumed from the crash site in India and recently returned to the U. S.

The wreckage of Capt. Ruckelshaus' plane was found on an India mountainside in October, 1944, after he had been reported missing by the War Department in May of that year.

Also surviving are five sisters, Miss Janet Bolt and Mrs. Euphemia McMurdo, Long Island, N. Y.; two sisters, Mrs. Mary Mawson and Miss Elizabeth Moore, a brother, Herbert Moore, all of Indianapolis, and two grandchildren.

The craft was believed to have crashed on the rugged mountain slope while on a mission investigating Japanese beacons.

Capt. Ruckelshaus was captain of the 1922 Cathedral High School grid team and later played football at South Bend under the late Knute Rockne.

The captain was a member of the University Club, Woodstock Club, Dramatic Club, Rotary Club, St. Joan of Arc Catholic Church and Sigma Chi, social fraternity.

Besides his wife, Capt. Ruckelshaus is survived by two brothers, John K. and Conrad.
