# Hang 6 Ringleaders In Czech Revolt Move

Boy, Girl Scout Leaders, Ex-Army Officers Among Group Condemned

The Czechoslovak government announced today that six ring-leaders of an alleged revolt involving former Boy and Girl Scout leaders and ex-Army officers were hanged this morning.

An announcement by the official government agency said clemency appeals by the six ringleaders were rejected by the Brno (Bryenn) Supreme Court.

The six were charged with participation in what was called the biggest anti-government plot since the Communists came into power in February, 1948.

In a brief announcement, the agency said the six were sentenced by the Prague State Court for "grave crimes of a criminal nature."

The first announcement of the planned revolt came Aug. 30 when the government revealed for the first time the plotters had planned an uprising which was smashed last spring.

The agency said the "revolutionists" collected arms and planned to seize key spots throughout the country.

Once in power, the agency said, they planned to remove certain people "by violence," pronounce martial law, disperse the national assembly, disband the security police, close down newspapers and return nationalized factories to their former owners.

The revolt was smashed after the rebels actually did march their way into Litomerice, some 25 miles north of Prague, and freed some leading prisoners, the agency said.

Other world developments:

**Belgrade** Non-Communist refugees from Albania said today that hundreds of Army and secret service police officers have been arrested there recently in a purge to stamp out acute anti-Russian dissatisfaction.

These sources said there have been recent anti-Soviet demonstrations in several areas of the country, including Tirana, the capital.

The Russians are disliked because Soviet trading agents are exporting food and essential goods while the population is near starvation, the sources said.

**Washington**

Secretary of State Dean Acheson today prepared to appeal to Britain and France to speed up the drive toward a united Europe.

U. S. officials said Mr. Acheson would go to the Paris meeting of the western big three next week ready to warn that if Europe does not unite now, both politically and economically, it may never again have the chance.

They said Mr. Acheson would seek to break the logjam which has delayed political and economic union despite the already existing agreement on the principles involved.

**The Hague**

Trygve Lie, secretary general of the United Nations, has asked the International Court of Justice whether the diplomatic exchanges between Bulgaria, Hungary and Romania, and certain allied powers, constitute a dispute.

The western powers charge that the Balkan nations violated the human rights clauses of their peace treaties by persecution of religious leaders and political dissidents.

**Paris**

Admission of western Germany and the Saar as associate members of the Council of Europe was considered virtually certain today among informed sources.

The foreign ministers of the 12 council nations, the executive body of the organization, voted unanimous approval of membership applications last night and referred the question to the standing committee of the council's consultative assembly.

**Berlin**

The British-licensed Berlin Telegraf said today that a large underground resistance movement exists inside the Russian army.

The Dispatch, datelined Berlin, was based on alleged reports from Russian officers, one of them a major, who had fled to the west.

Western allied intelligence authorities discounted the Telegraf reports.

**Lake Success**

General agreement between Britain and the United States enhanced hopes today that the United Nations General Assembly will settle the future of the former Italian colonies at its present session.

As the assembly's main political committee began its discussion of the Italian colonial problem yesterday, it became apparent that Washington and London had patched up their differences concerning a plan advanced by

**Native of Brookville Killed in Bermuda**

An Indiana pilot was among 10 Air Force men killed in a B-29 Superfortress crash at Hamilton, Bermuda, yesterday while an other Hoosier was listed as one of three survivors.

Maj. Roy H. Burns, the pilot, was a native of Brookville, the Air Force said. He was one of three crewmen listed as dead. The others were listed as missing.

Capt. Cleo S. Maddox, radar officer of Kokomo, former Indiana University football player, was among the three survivors picked up from the water. He was critically injured.

Nine airmen were missing and three were rescued from the water, all critically injured.
