## Underdog Navy Turns Vicious and Shows Up Tulane in 21-21 Tie

**Green Wave Fails to Match Middies' Pass Attack, Proves Unimpressive Again**

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 5 (UP)—Navy, an underdog that turned vicious, held Tulane University's football team to a 21 to 21 tie today.

It was almost as bad as defeat for Tulane, trampled by Notre Dame and winner in most of its Southeastern Conference games by unimpressive scores. Tulane had hoped for victory today by a margin that would get it noticed by some bowl selections committee.

But the only thing that saved Tulane from an outright beating was the fact that its fullback, Eddie Price, hasn't any ambition.

to be an admiral. Price scored all three of Tulane's touchdowns, one of them by running 68 yards, nearly without interference.

**Couldn't Match Passing**  
Tulane simply couldn't match Navy's Bob Zastrow to Vic Vine passing combination. A homecoming crowd estimated at 70,000—the largest crowd ever to see a regularly scheduled football game in the South—nearly filled Tulane stadium in clear, cool weather.

Navy, a 14-point underdog, was fighting mad after its 40 to 0 beating last Saturday by Notre Dame. Although Tulane won the toss, it decided to kick off. That was a mistake.

Navy took the ball on its own eight-yard line and ran it back to the 12. Zastrow passed to Right Half Bill Powers for a 29-yard gain, then Navy went straight down the field with it, and Zastrow passed to Vine for five yards and Navy's first touchdown.

## Big League Draft Set for Nov. 17

**Annual Ritual Noted for 'Busts'**

NEW YORK, Nov. 5 (UP)—If the forthcoming major league draft, scheduled for Cincinnati on Nov. 17, follows precedent, it should develop into nothing more or less than an annual waste of time.

The winter draft is a yearly ritual notorious for the baseball "busts" it produces.

Last year, for example, 20 minor league players were drafted by big league clubs at a cost of \$100,000. None of those 20 players came even remotely close to approaching stardom and less than half of them stuck with the clubs who drafted them.

**5000 Are Eligible**  
This year, the draft rolls list some 5000 minor leaguers who are eligible to be selected by major league clubs. Of that total, there are probably not enough bona fide big leaguers among them to form a single club.

To be sure, there are a handful of triple-A players up for draft who look to be a steal at \$10,000, the price for a selecting major league club.

The best buys appear to be the property of the Brooklyn Dodgers. Players like Outfielder Clint Conner and Pitcher Harry Taylor of St. Paul in the American Association, or Outfielder George Schmees, Shortstop Fred Hancock and Pitcher Clyde King of Montreal in the International League.

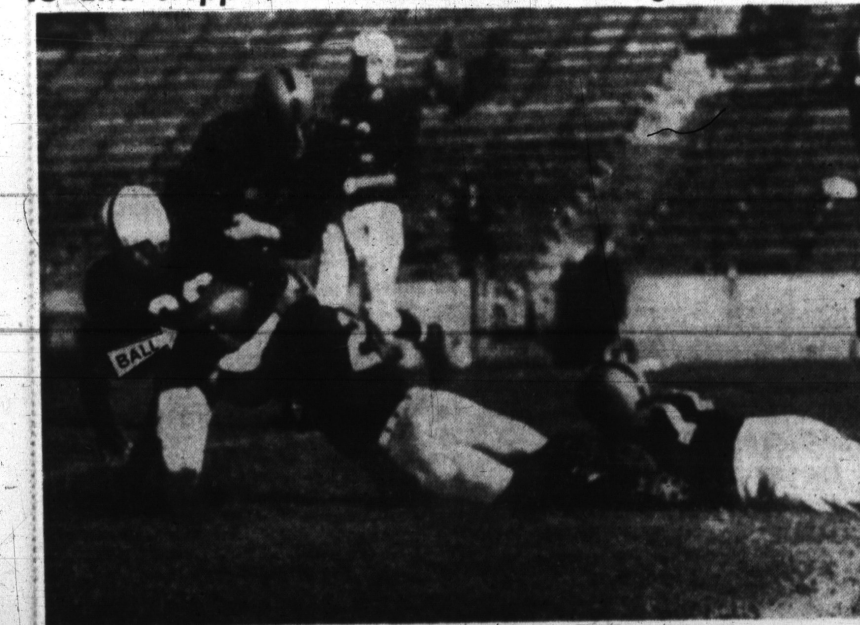
## Scampers 101 Yards For Holy Cross TD

## Passing Pays Off For Iowa State

**Weeks Paces 21-8 Victory Over Drake**

DES MOINES, Iowa, Nov. 5 (UP)—Iowa State relied on the vaunted passing arm of Bill Weeks today to win the traditional battle with Drake, 21 to 8, before a record homecoming crowd of 20,000 fans.

Weeks hit nine of 20 passes for 141 yards to pile up more than half of the Cyclone yardage. But homecoming fans saw the nation's number one ground gainer, Drake sophomore Johnny Bright, pass and run for 159 yards despite injury.

A pulled muscle in his leg obviously hampered the 190-pound Negro flash as he broke into the open several times, only to be pulled down. But he still paced the Bulldog attack.

The Cyclones scored a touchdown in each of the first three periods and only trailed once. They utilized blocked punts, fumbles and intercepted passes for all three scores.

## Texas Tumbles Baylor, 20-0

AUSTIN, Tex., Nov. 5 (UP)—Texas struck hard with a slashing aerial and ground game today to tumble Baylor from the ranks of the nation's unbeaten teams; 20-0, before 60,000 fans.

The two clubs played a tight defensive game in the first half but Texas broke loose in a fourth-period flurry to mark up two touchdowns, sparked by the charging ground game of Ray Borneman and Randall Clay and the passing of Paul Campbell.

Coach Blair Cherry's Texans, three-time losers this season, throttled the Baylor passing ace, Adrian Burk, outplaying the Baptist eleven all the way and allowing them to penetrate only as far as the Longhorn 14-yard line.

## Wake Forest Blasts Duke's Line, Wins, 27-7

DURHAM, N. C., Nov. 5 (UP)—Wake Forest backs' subterranean and ran around Duke's heralded eight-man line today for a 27 to 7 victory before 35,000 shivering fans.

Halfbacks Lou Pollard and Bill Gregus and Fullback Bill Miller ate up 199 yards against the defense that stopped Georgia Tech last week while the Wake Forest line held Duke to a net of 17 yards.

## Justice Injures Ankle as Tarheels Edge Wm. & Mary

**Choo-Choo Scores 2 TD's as N. Carolina Wins Out in Closing Minutes**

WILLIAMSBURG, Va., Nov. 5 (UP)—Fullback Billy Hayes, pacing a desperate 59-yard North Carolina scoring drive, passed to End Art Weiner for a touchdown in the final minutes today and gave the Tarheels a breathless 20-14 victory over William and Mary before 22,000 fans.

Charlie Justice, North Carolina's star halfback, passed for one touchdown in the third period and then scored again on his longest run of the season, a 75-yard punt return. But he had to be helped off the field twice in the final period after injuring his ankle on a kickoff return.

**Lex Uncorks Passes**  
William and Mary grabbed the lead by scoring with 13 straight plays the first time it got the ball.

Buddy Lex started uncorking passes. He hit Halfback Ed Weber with a pass to the 27, and then a high looper to End Vito Ragazzo in the end zone.

Lex added the extra point, giving William and Mary a lead the Indians held until the third period.

A fumble of the second half kickoff gave Carolina the ball on the William and Mary 18. Two plays later Justice passed, from the 21 to Halfback George Verchick in the end zone. Tackle Egbert Williams added the point to tie the score.

Justice ripped off his 75-yard scoring run when William and Mary punted after failing to gain following the next kickoff.

**Tarheels Slash Back**  
But Lex opened up with aerials again, completing five passes that contributed the bulk of an 83-yard drive. His scoring pass went from the 3 to Fullback Ed Magdziak in the end zone.

Lex kicked it again, for a one-point W. & M. margin. Carolina slashed back viciously with Hayes and Sophomore Halfback Dick Bunting leading a victory drive. Bugged down on the 16, Hayes drew back his arm on fourth down and fired 16 yards into the end zone to big Art Weiner. Williams converted.

## Stanford Upsets Southern Cal, 34-13

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 5 (UP)—A youthful, fired-up Stanford football team confounded the experts today by upsetting powerful Southern California, 34 to 13, and remained in the race for the Rose Bowl.

Southern California was favored by 7½ points to take Stanford in stride, but the team from Palo Alto, Cal., ran its heavier rivals dizzy in the second period when it scored three touchdowns.

Stanford's victory was a team triumph in which the line performed as brilliantly as the backs. The forwards kept Southern California's hard-plunging backs in check and throttled passer Jim Powers while Stanford's swift backs ran their rivals' ends ragged.

## Galiffa Hurls 4 Scoring Passes, Lines Crunch And Grind Each Other

**Each Team Gets 7 Penalties, Mostly for Slugging, and One Cadet Is Ejected**

WEST POINT, N. Y., Nov. 5—Army's crashing Cadets rolled over Fordham's battering Rams today, 35 to 0, in a grim and vicious battle of the undefeated which saw a total of 277 yards in penalties meted out and one player banished from the game.

It was a slugging Donny Brook from the start in a cold rain to the finish in purple shadows which blanketed tiny Michie Stadium. But Army's jabbing juggernaut had more than enough to score its seventh straight conquest as the reeling Rams lost for the first time in five starts.

A chilled capacity crowd of 27,100 saw Arnold Galiffa, Army's air arm, toss the Cadets to victory with four touchdown heaves as the lines crunched and ground.

Two Army touchdowns were called back on penalties during the slugfest in which Army Guard Charles Galloway was ejected from the game and four 15 yard roughness penalties were called during the kicking of one extra point.

Fordham was in its own back yard during the first quarter but three times fought off Army drives—on the 3, 19 and 25—twice on fumbles. But, after one touchdown was recalled in the second quarter, Army drove to its first touchdown, driving 75 yards and finishing it up with a 7-yard pass from Galiffa to Dan Foldberg.

A pass interception set up the next one and Galiffa pegged 31 yards to Jim Cain for the touchdown. Then came the main event, as Jack Mackmull tried for the extra point.

Fordham, sparked by the passing of Quarterback Dick Doheny, drove to Army's 19 in the third period and to the Cadet 15 in the final moments but both times was repulsed.
