

# 2-Car Crash Kills Three; 3 Others Hurt

Collision Occurs  
On 4-Lane Road  
Near Huntington

Three persons were killed and three others critically injured when two cars collided on U. S. 26, five miles east of Huntington late yesterday.

The dead are Mrs. Bruce Corey, 70; Mark Denton, 50, and Fred Schutt Sr., 63, all of Huntington.

Mrs. Denton and Mr. Corey were in a Huntington hospital with multiple injuries. George Seber was treated and released for lesser hurts.

State police said the accident happened when Mr. Corey, driving with his wife, turned through a cut-over on the four-lane highway to change directions.

He was hit broadside by the car operated by Mr. Schutt. Mrs. Corey was thrown clear of the wreckage and her husband was pinned beneath the wheel. The others were taken from the wreckage of Mr. Schutt's car.

Second victim of a truck crash near Kokomo on Oct. 24 was identified yesterday as John Thomas Hase, 21, of Philadelphia.

George Metcalf, of Terre Haute, also was killed in the crash. Mr. Hase was identified by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Hase of Philadelphia.

An Indiana truck driver was severely burned in a car-truck crash last night near Palatine Bridge, N. Y., in which a New York woman died.

Donald K. Sturgis, 24, of Bluffton, was in a critical condition in an Amsterdam hospital after his truck cab caught fire. The dead woman was identified as Mrs. Charles A. Smith of Palatine Bridge. She was thrown through the windshield of her husband's car.

**Hattie Kennedy Rites In Wilkinson Wednesday**

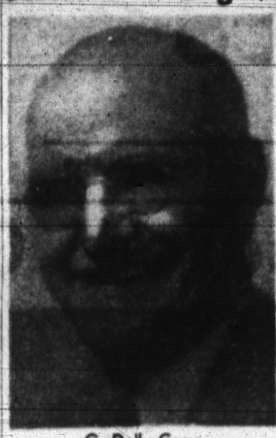

**Concrete Corporation President Dies at 63**

C. Dolly Gray, president of the Ready-Mix Concrete Corp. and former chief engineer of the Indiana State Highway Commission, died yesterday in his home, 6815 Westfield Blvd., at 63.

Owner of the concrete firm, he was also past president of the National Ready-Mix Concrete Association. He served as chief engineer of Indiana's highways from 1920 to 1925.

A native of Shelbyville, he had lived in Indianapolis 36 years. He was a trustee and member of the board of managers of Rose Polytechnic Institute, of which he was a graduate. During World War I he served as a captain in the Engineering Corps.

Active in civic and community affairs, Mr. Gray was a lifetime member of the Boy Scouts, Neb. and a member of the Indianapolis Chamber of Commerce.

In addition, he was a member of the Broad Ripple American Legion Post, Rotary Club, Columbia Club, Athletic Club, Highland Country Club and Junco Club.
