

Scientists To Meet Here For 3 Days

Sessions to Open Thursday in IU Medical Center

Outstanding scientists from all over the United States, Canada and Mexico will come to Indianapolis for the three-day meeting of the American Society for Pharmacology and Experimental Therapeutics opening Thursday in Indiana University Medical Center.

More than a hundred scientific reports dealing with the action of drugs now under study for medical purposes in research laboratories will be presented.

Two symposiums are scheduled during the session.

One Thursday will center around the currently prominent antihistaminics, drugs useful in treatment of allergic diseases. On Friday, antibiotic drugs such as penicillin and streptomycin will be discussed.

All sessions will be held at the School of Medicine with the exception of the convention banquet Friday night in the Claypool Hotel.

Numerous Speakers

Speakers participating in the meeting will come from the teaching and research fields of universities and from the laboratories of government and private institutions and commercial firms engaged in therapeutic research.

The fall meeting of the society, the first which it has held, was brought to Indianapolis through the efforts of Dr. H. R. Hupliu, professor of pharmacology at the Indiana University School of Medicine, and other local members.

Dr. Hupliu is serving as chairman of the committee arranging the meeting, with the assistance of the members including: Dr. B. E. Abreu, research department, Pittman-Moore Co.; Dr. K. E. Chen, director of pharmacological research, Eli Lilly & Co., and member of the staff of the Indiana University School of Medicine; Dr. Versa V. Cole, associate professor of pharmacology, I. U. School of Medicine; Dr. R. N. Harger, chairman department of biochemistry and pharmacology, I. U. School of Medicine; and Dr. Paul N. Harris, division of pharmacology, Eli Lilly & Co.

2 Yeggs on Rampage Loot Nine Safes of \$4500 in Night

Police Suspect Pair Used New Robbers' Device to Get Into Places

SIOUX FALLS, S. D., Nov. 14 (UP)—Businessmen sought new hiding places for their cash today after two safecrackers roamed through town and broke into nine safes for a \$4500 take.

The fast-working team pulled the cracking unaided except at a 10-cent store where the manager, Shirley Clark, returned to check on the store's heating system and the two men took advantage of the unexpected visit.

"You're just the man we've been waiting for," one said. Then they forced Mr. Clark to open a small vault inside a larger safe they already had forced open.

They trussed up the manager while they emptied the box of \$4000. It was their biggest haul.

After the men left, Mr. Clark shook the door and shouted to his wife who was waiting outside. She summoned police who freed him.

Evidence indicated that the safecrackers were experienced burglars who had planned each job carefully.

"The real mystery," one officer said, "was how they broke into the different places."

"They were both good safecrackers and expert burglars. Either they picked the locks or used a 'lock gun'."

He explained a "lock gun" as a new, underworld tool which operates the tumblers of a lock by suction.

Confessed Slayer Tries Second Time to Kill Self

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 14 (UP)—Carlo Diliberto, 41, was in serious condition today after slashing his throat in his second suicide attempt since he confessed killing a St. Louis University student last January.

Diliberto, awaiting trial for the fatal shooting of John F. X. Rea, 25, was found in a pool of blood on the floor of his cell after a guard had given him a razor blade to shave.

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Hunt MP and Pal in Hospital Break

DENVER, Nov. 14 (UP)—Soldiers and state patrolmen surrounded a wooded area north of here today in an attempt to capture a fugitive military policeman and a mental patient he helped to escape.

The provost marshal at Fitzsimmons General Hospital said the patient, 26-year-old Thomas J. Mulligan of Philadelphia, known as "dangerously insane," was released from the guardhouse yesterday in a jailbreak engineered by Pvt. Duane F. Teeters, 22, a member of the hospital's military police guard.

Maj. Harold Krohn, provost marshal, described the two fugitives as "armed and dangerous."

A full-page, cross-section drawing of the 24-story building was pictured to show the shelters.

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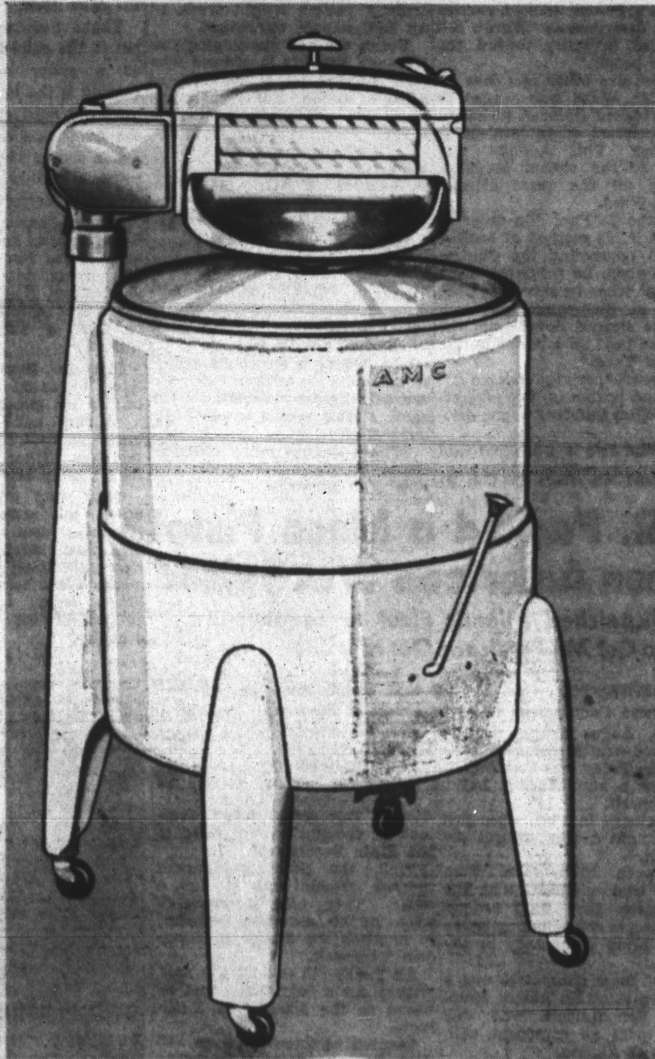
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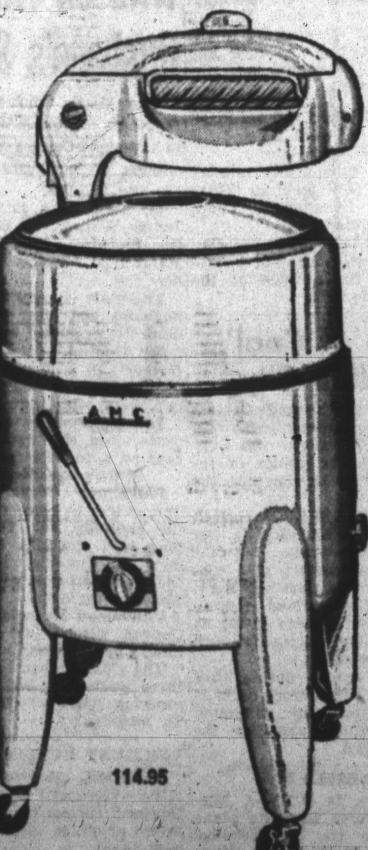
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
