### Blackwood on Bridge—Miss Brash Makes Bidding Look Good by Sharp Play

MISS LUCY BRASH may be the world's looziest bidder but she can play the cards with the best of them, as this deal well illustrates.

Mr. Abel tried to keep up with her for awhile on this hand but finally gave it up as a bad job and doubled the five-club contract. That was a mistake, too.

Mrs. Keen opened with the deuce of spades. Mr. Abel played the queen and Miss Brash ruffed. Looking at the situation over she saw that she had one heart loser and probably two diamond losers.

In other words, Mr. Abel's strong bidding made it fairly sure he had the king of diamonds behind dummy's queen.

To eliminate one of these losers Miss Brash proceeded as follows: At trick two she led a heart and put in dummy's 10 when Mrs. Keen played low. Mr. Abel won with the queen and returned a club which was taken on the board with the jack.

Another spade was led and ruffed in the closed hand. Mr. Abel played the five of spades on this trick. Now a heart was led to dummy's ace and a third spade returned. Here Mr. Abel made the mistake of playing the 10 spot, which gave Miss Brash a chance to make her contract.

### Leads Her Last Heart

Miss Brash ruffed the third lead of spades in her hand. At this point she was ready for the crucial play. She led dummy's last spade and when Mr. Abel played the king, she calmly threw off her deuce of diamonds.

Note that if Mr. Abel had saved one of his small spades he could have played it on this trick and Mrs. Keen would have won with the jack for a lead THROUGH dummy's queen of diamonds.

As it was, however, Mr. Abel found himself in the lead with three hopeless choices of a return. He could fire back a spade or a heart, either of which would be ruffed in dummy while Miss Brash discarded the last losing diamond from her hand; or he could play a small diamond which would be ducked in the closed hand and won by dummy's queen. Obviously the lead of the king of diamonds was also a hopeless proposition.

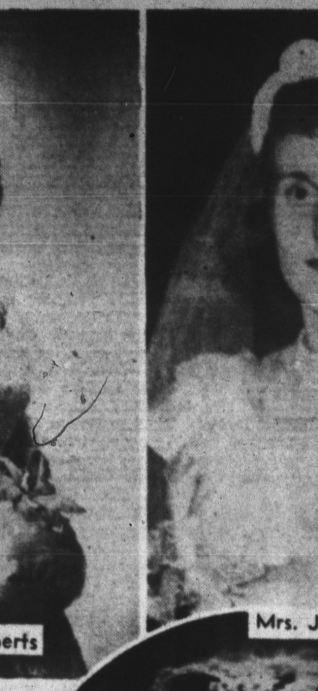
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Actually Mr. Abel led a spade and Miss Brash dropped her six of diamonds and ruffed with dummy's 10 of clubs. She came back to her hand with the ace of diamonds and the last three cards in her hand were the ace, king, queen of trumps.

Miss Brash could not take two rounds of trumps early in the hand because it was vital to have one trump in dummy at the time of the throw-in. She was extremely lucky to find Mr. Abel with the singleton club holding. But apparently she took this as no more than right.

Her only comment was, "Particular, for a moment I thought we had missed a slam."

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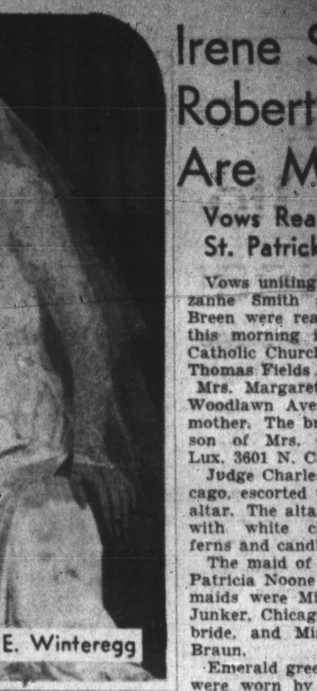
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
