

# New Pin Loop Is Up and Coming A Long Run Backward to Gain a Few Yards

Low in Scoring  
But High in Spirit

It would be difficult for any bowling league throughout Indiana to display more enthusiasm and competitive spirit than that shown by the Western Electric loop in their first year of activity.

First, let it be stated that the keggers within this circuit are not to be compared with the better bowlers in town. Few men have turned in scores of 600 or better and only one woman has been able to support a mark of at least 600.

Within the framework of this first-year league are six different loops, three men and three women. Four of the circuits compete at Fountain Square and the other two are in action at Dezelan's on Sunday evenings.

Unlike many such leagues and teams any individual that takes part or wishes to be a part of this circuit must be an employee of the Western Electric Company. The plant is well represented. There are bowlers from the office as well as all other departments of the company.

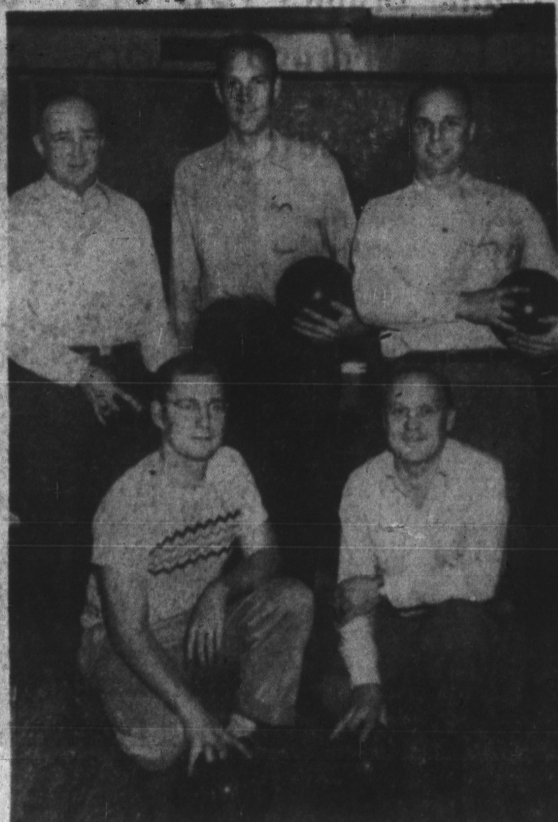
250 Enrolled

Approximately 1200 persons are employed at Western Electric and a rough estimation reveals that around 250 are already enrolled in one of the various leagues.

The company is counting on the new plant, already under construction, to provide even more interest in the ten pin sport.

Chiefly responsible for the organization of the leagues are two out-of-town gentlemen. They are Mike Osterchill and a Mr. Metcalfe, both of whom hail from Chicago. Metcalfe is in charge of the recreation and of things at the plant and along with Osterchill can take most of the credit for getting the six loops started off on the right foot.

You will not see any fabulous marks coming out of any of the leagues—not for a few years anyway. The reason for this situation is an obvious one—most of the participants could be listed as "beginners" in the game. Larry Lehmann, manager of the Fountain Square alleys, estimates that

from 75 to 80 per cent of the women are beginners and that approximately 40 per cent of the male keggers are in their first year of competition.

A good example of a team within the circuit would be the Red Sox aggregation. This team rolls in the Thursday night session at the Fountain and is currently leading the rest of the pack with a record of 22 wins and 11 defeats. This includes games through Thursday, Nov. 17.

on the team. He and L. Kotarek of a different team are the only keggers who have chalked up a three-game total of better than 600. Reaser also sets the pace in the individual average department, boasting a figure of 178. His single game of 243 which he came up with recently stands as his highest game of the year. He is one of the select group of experienced bowlers in the group, of which there aren't too many.

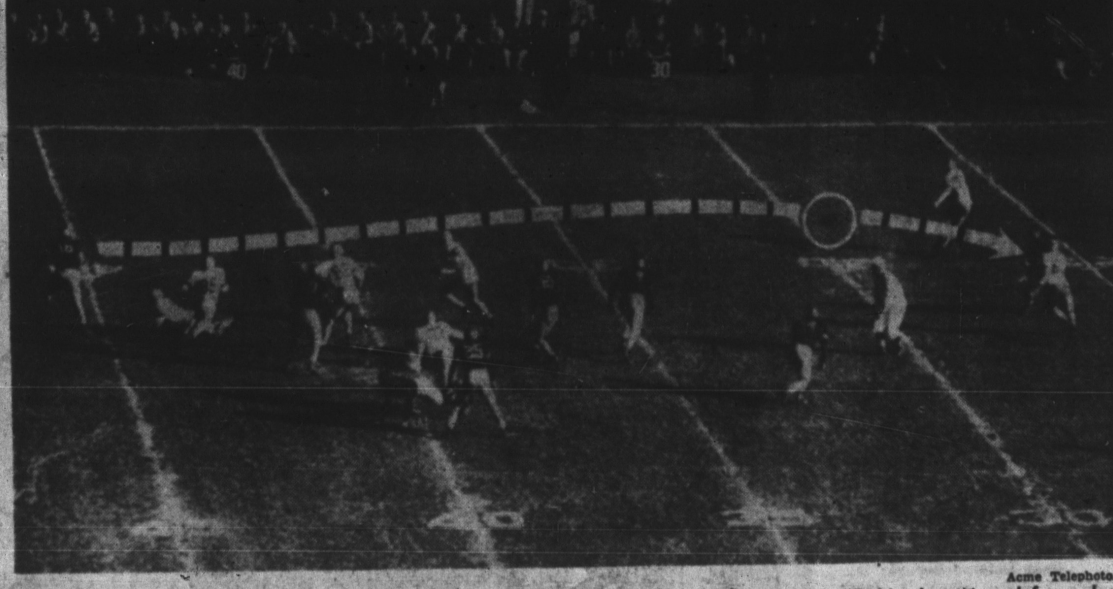
In the feminine division the problem is much the same. In Lehmann's opinion, there are a great many more inexperienced bowlers among the ladies than there are the men. On the basis of performances to date, we could class Claire Sundman as being the best pin buster in the feminine class. Claire is from Duluth, Minn., and her average of 160 tops the best any of the other women have to offer.

She rolls what is known as a "Minnesota" ball. This means the kegler puts quite a bit of "reverse English" on the throw. Claire is the only female to date who has registered a series as high as 500.

Expect to Expand

Metcalfe and Osterchill along with others responsible for the operation of the leagues have made it clear that they intend to expand into an even bigger outfit in the years to come. When the new plant is ready for business there will be plenty of additional persons wanting to join one of the leagues.

Plans are also being drawn up to make the organization a city-wide affair. Instead of some of the keggers being forced to travel from one end of town to the other, the hope is to be able to assign the North Side residents to an alley closer to their homes. The same procedure would follow in the case of the person who lives on the South Side and so on. Despite the fact that there won't be any earth shaking totals or games turned in by the league's participants, it looks as if the group is here to stay. What they lack in experience and finesse they equal in enthusiasm and competitive spirit.

Bobby Vinson returning the Navy kickoff 92 yards to a touchdown—one of the longest runs in this colorful spectacle.

From that point it was "on brave old Army team."

Army had only one weakness—it converted only two of the possible six points after the touchdowns.

Army showed President Truman, the 10 members of the Cabinet, all the Army and Navy brass and the others in the vast throng what was coming when it took Navy's opening kickoff and, without surrendering the ball, went all the way for its first score.

Galiffa, who only three days ago was being voted onto the United Press 1949 All-America team, personally engineered the score.

Bob Aelman had returned the kickoff from the Army 13 to the 34. But, just when it looked like Navy might hold, Galiffa, apparently trapped for a long loss on an attempted pass, ran with the ball and swept to the Navy 40.

From that point he fed the ball to Stephenson four straight times for first and 10 on the Navy 24. Then Galiffa passed to Frank Fischl on the 11, Stephenson

buckled to the 5 and then went over with Mackmull adding the extra point.

It wasn't until midway through the second period that it was able to dent the stout Navy defense again. And once more it was Galiffa passing and Stephenson running, with Galiffa running left end for 5 yards and the score.

Ran Out of Gas

Navy, which went into Army territory only once—and not until

the third quarter—held for the rest of the half but then the Mid-dies ran out of gas.

Vinson's long run made it 19 to 0 and Navy had shot its bolt.

An intercepted pass led to Army's next score. Karl Kuckbahn took Bob Zastrow's throw on the Navy 45 and returned it to the 37.

Stephenson carried it over from the 2 after Galiffa, once more slipping out of a trap attempting to pass, ran to that point.

On the first play of the fourth quarter Stephenson went through tackle to score from the 2 after

## W. & M. Slugs Out 33-to-7 Win Over N. Carolina State

WILLIAMSBURG, Va., Nov. 26 (UP)—William and Mary slugged North Carolina State College 40 to a 33-7 defeat before 8000 fans here today.

William and Mary End Vito Ragazzo gathered in two touchdowns passes from Tailback Buddy Lex to break his own previous record and run his total of completions for the season to 15.

The rugged State line kept William and Mary from turning the game into a rout. But State's crippled backfield lacked offensive punch. For the first time this season William and Mary Fullback Jack Cloud was thrown for losses as the State forward wall ripped through behind the spearheading of Tackle Elmer Costa and Guard Charlie Musser.

The sharp passing of Tailback Buddy Lex accounted for State's only score in the third period. He pitched seven completed passes in 10 attempts as State swept from its 26 to the William and Mary 1. From there Smith busted it over in one of the three running plays of the drive. Guard Jim Byler converted.

But it was William and Mary's game from the time the Indians grabbed the ball in the State's first scrimmage play. Halfback Don Howren intercepted a pass by Tailback Bill Thompson on the William and Mary 40 to start a 60-yard drive for the first William and Mary score. Cloud and Wingback Ed Weber bore the brunt of the ground attack.

Lex booted three extra points.

William and Mary led 13-0 at the half, 26-0 at the end of the third quarter, and 33-7 at the end of the game.

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## Berry Passes TCU To 21-13 Victory

FT. WORTH, Tex., Nov. 26 (UP)—Texas Christian University's perpetual motion man, Lindy Berry, passed Southern Methodist today to close out his collegiate career with a brilliant exhibition that gave TCU a 21-13 victory before a 33,000 capacity crowd.

The 175-pound senior quarterback scored one touchdown and passed for two more to steal the spotlight away from his All-American SMU counterpart, Doak Walker, who left the game early in the second half because of injuries.

Taking to the air to beat the favored Mustangs at their own game, TCU roared behind a first-down-drive-to-40-at-up at the half, go ahead in the third quarter and salt it away in the final period and finish in a tie with Texas for third place in the Southwest Conference race.

Walker had kept SMU in a threatening position with his passing and running until he left the field for good, but he had able assistance from Kyle Rote, who smashed his way for 37 yards for SMU's first touchdown.

Flicking passes with amazing accuracy to ends and halfbacks who either maneuvered into the open ranges or made leaping catches, Berry tossed one to Halfback Jimmy Hickey good for 56 yards and the first score and a 21-0 lead for TCU at the end of the first quarter.

Some 48,000 shivering fans rushed to their feet as Edwards rushed out to protest two called-back Vandy touchdowns. His hat flew off his balding head and a mob of fans followed him. Edwards was marched to the dressing room by Vandy players to save him from rabid Vandy partisans.

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
