# Bulgaria Charges U.S. Guided Accused Spy

## American Envoy Likened to Tito On Eve of Treason Plot Trial

The Communist government today formally charged its former vice premier, Traicho Kostov, with plotting to assassinate the late Premier Georgi Dimitrov and start a revolution with Yugoslav and American support.

The 20,000-word indictment said Mr. Kostov and 10 co-defendants would be tried on an undisclosed date for "treason, treachery, espionage and economic sabotage."

The indictment quoted Mr. Kostov as saying the United States had reached "complete agreement" with Yugoslavia's Marshal Tito to back a revolution by which Bulgaria would be annexed to Yugoslavia.

American support was pledged by Donald Read Heath, U. S. minister in Sofia, the indictment said. It quoted Mr. Kostov:

"Heath pointed out that the advice which I will receive from Tito and his closest collaborators, I must consider as the advice also of the Americans, and in this respect between them and Tito, there has been complete agreement."

Mr. Heath, the indictment said, made the statement in 1947 when, as new U. S. minister, he conferred with Mr. Kostov, then acting premier.

### Czechoslovakia

A COMMUNIST party official has been ordered tried for black marketing and hiding food, the trade union newspaper Prace disclosed today.

The official, Vojtech Ruzicka, has been expelled from the party and arrested, the newspaper said. It said he made \$2000 selling eggs on the black market and \$1250 selling pigs.

"But the saddest thing," the newspaper said, "is that Ruzicka used to be a stone mason—a worker. The selfish desire for money and his new property spoiled his character."

### Yugoslavia

THE Yugoslav government celebrated its sixth anniversary last night with a lavish buffet reception to which Russian and other Eastern Europe diplomats were not invited.

### Great Britain

AMERICAN, British and other Western delegations ran into opposition today in their efforts to align the new anti-Communist world labor organization squarely behind the Atlantic Pact and the Western Union.

Sweden objected. It wants to eliminate all references to regional agreements. Sweden is not a member of either the Atlantic Pact or the Western Union, both regional agreements under the United Nations charter.

Denmark, although a member of both groups, supported the Swedish proposal. So did the Belgian delegation.

### Soviet Union

RADIO Moscow, as heard in London, said today that an American Army sergeant, who was a member of the American Communist party, is depicted as one of the principal characters in the new Soviet play "The Voice of America," which opened in Moscow last night.

The play, Moscow said, "shows how ordinary Americans raise their voices in defense of peace and democracy. The heroes are Capt. Walter Kidd, an honest-minded American, Sgt. Malcolm MacDonald, member of the American Communist party, and their friends."

"The Voice of America" is the name of the American broadcast set up to pierce the Iron Curtain. The Kremlin has gone all-out to jam the broadcast.

### West Germany

APPROVAL of licenses for political parties has been handed back to German control, the U. S. High Commission announced today.

Political parties may now be licensed according to the laws of the individual West German states. Parties previously needed military government licenses.

### New Zealand

NEW ZEALAND'S Labor (Socialist) government, whose program paralleled that of Britain's Labor government, was defeated in general elections today by the Nationalist "free enterprise" party.

The nation's swing to the right ended 14 years of Socialist rule.

## New A-Bomb Tests Slated

### Improved Weapon to Get Eniwetok Tryout

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30 (UP)—A task force now being organized will test at Eniwetok, probably next spring, new A-bombs expected to be a "major improvement" over the weapons tried out there last year.

At least three bombs will be detonated under the strictest secrecy. The western Pacific proving ground, established in 1947, is out of bounds to all unauthorized planes and ships, American or foreign.

That the new tests will be held was disclosed in a curt announcement issued jointly yesterday by the Armed Forces and the Atomic Energy Commission.

Making Even Better Bombs Just when they will be held, how many "atomic weapons" will be detonated, and precisely why new tests must be held so soon after the 1948 experiments were not revealed.

But it has been stated officially—before and since the Sept. 23 announcement that Russia has learned to explode the atom—that this nation is perfecting bombs even better than those proved at Eniwetok in April and May last year.

And those bombs, according to public statements by Sen. Edwin C. Johnson (D. Colo.), are six times more powerful than the wartime model which wrecked Nagasaki.

Sen. Johnson, a member of the congressional Atomic Energy Committee, also said this country is developing a "super bomb," employing hydrogen as well as uranium or plutonium and 1000 times more powerful than the Nagasaki weapon.

### Scientifically Possible

A hydrogen bomb, employing nuclear processes operating in the sun and stars, is scientifically possible, according to physicists. Whether it is technically feasible remains to be seen.

It was understood, however, that the new weapons to be detonated in the forthcoming tests are not "super bombs." In the Johnsonian sense, but refined designs suggested by last year's tests.

Navy and air patrols are expected to clear the area—a region of ocean about 200 miles square—of all craft having no business there.

That at least three weapons will be detonated was indicated by the official announcement that there will be a "series of tests."

That the tests cannot be held before next spring is indicated by two factors. Task forces of the size needed, and complex scientific preparations of the kind required, cannot be dreamed up overnight.

And not until next spring and summer will weather conditions in the Marshall Islands be most suitable for fleet operations.

## Stabbed as He Tries To Stop Card Game

George C. Ray, 5746 E. 16th St., was the loser in a card game in which he wasn't even a player. Mr. Ray, employed at Hodges Auction Co., 960 N. Meridian St., tried to break up a three-card monte game in the alley back of the firm yesterday. One of the three players resented his intrusion and began stabbing at him with a pocket knife.

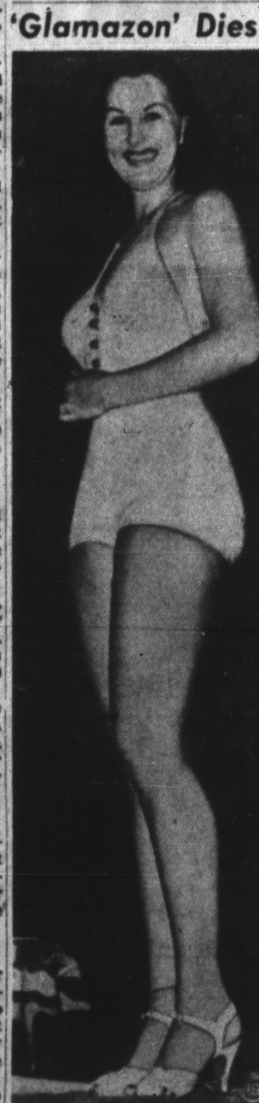
Mr. Ray was treated at General Hospital for stab wounds in the stomach and several other cuts. The card players fled before arrival of police.

Elinor Troy

The 33-year-old beauty was famed as the first "glamazon" to be introduced by producer Billy Rose and appeared in Hollywood shows and on Broadway. Miss Troy was at the threshold of a movie career when stricken.

### Italy

THE Communist-controlled Confederation of Labor today ordered a nation-wide 24-hour general strike tomorrow to protest a gun battle between police and striking farmhands in Torremaggiore. Three persons were killed and 12 injured.

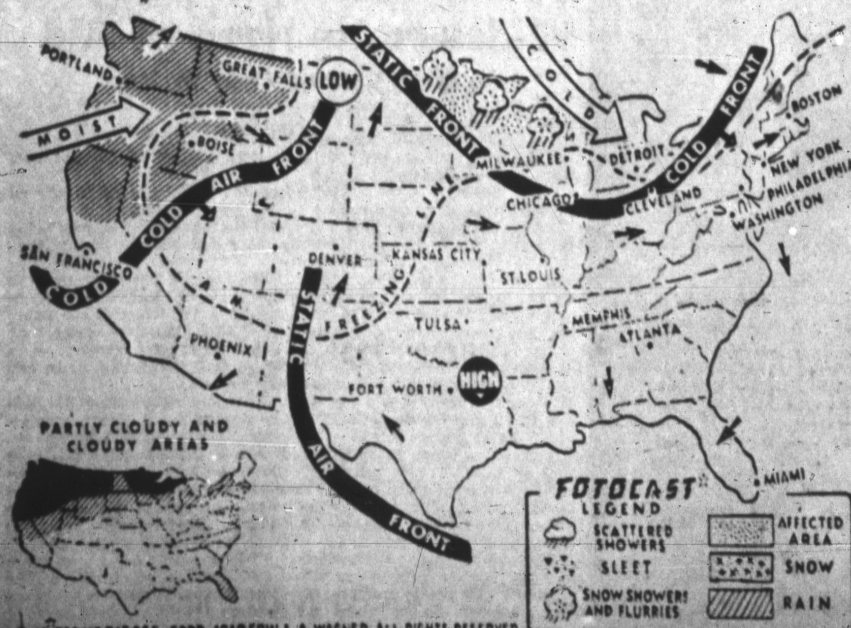
Premier Alcide De Gasperi defeated the Communists in a Senate confidence test last night and warned them to stop their attacks against the Catholic church.

A Communist motion of no-confidence was defeated, 162 to 88, with nine senators abstaining. The House of Deputies earlier had given the premier an easy victory on the same issues.
