

Appeal Planned Against Apartment

Board OK's 83-Unit,
\$760,000 Structure

A Zoning Board ruling which approves erection of a proposed 83-unit apartment building at 3650 Central Ave. will be appealed, attorneys representing objectors said today.

A delegation of about 25 property owners in the area appeared before the board last night in a move to halt the project. Despite their protests, the petition of E. F. Hohl, builder, was approved by a six to two vote.

C. Titus Everett, attorney representing Dr. David H. Suss, 3657 Washington Blvd., said the decision will be appealed.

The proposed building would contain 24 one-bedroom apartments and 59 two-bedroom units. Total cost will be approximately \$760,000.

Property line would extend 400 feet along Central Ave. and parking spaces would be provided for 60 cars.

Objectors said construction of an apartment building in the neighborhood would decrease the value of their property in addition to increasing the traffic problem on Central Ave.

They also contended that present sewer lines in the area would not be adequate if apartment lines were connected to them.
