

U. S. Tax Collector Foresees Big Rush

Many Just Awaiting Earnings Statements

Ralph W. Cripe, Indiana collector of internal revenue, today predicted there will be "standing room only" next week in the Federal building line of Hoosier tax-payers.

He said many employers, who by law are required to furnish employees with a statement of 1949 earnings by Jan. 31, plan to include the statement in pay envelopes this week-end.

Only the lack of this statement has kept many taxpayers from the lines, Mr. Cripe said. More than 100 taxpayers stood in line during the forenoon yesterday. During the "slack" afternoon period, however, auditors were able to give immediate assistance in the filing of income tax returns.

Meanwhile, Mr. Cripe announced the collection of more than a billion dollars in federal taxes in Indiana last year. A record of \$1,047,193,108.26 in federal taxes collected during 1949 exceeded the 1948 Hoosier collection by \$60,760,194.68.

The greatest single tax increase was \$18,675,771.04 boost in withholding taxes over the 1948 figure.

Substantially more autos, trucks and chassis were sold with a consequent increase in the collection of the 7 per cent manufacturers' levy on these items.

Tax collections from movies, sporting events and other amusements fell off in 1949, according to the tabulation. Wine and beer tax collections were also lighter, but levies on distilled spirits were greater.

Carl Nauert, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leon Nauert of 2012 W. 36th St., was killed yesterday, Indianapolis police said, when the gun discharged in the living room of the home of Lawrence Smith, 12, a neighbor.

Investigators said the boys were planning a hunting trip and that young Smith was putting the gun away when it exploded. The Smith boy, grief-stricken by the death of his friend, told police they had postponed the hunting trip after young Nauert had arrived at his home too late for the expedition.

Besides his parents, Carl is survived by a younger brother, Paul, aged 6, and his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Rollie Christie.

Services will be at 8:15 a. m. Friday in the G. H. Herrmann Funeral Home, and at 9 a. m. in the St. Ann's Church. Burial will be in St. Joseph's Cemetery.

Music Society Plans Concert Changes







Anderson School Inquiry Begins

Committee Probes 'Politics' Charges

ANDERSON, Jan. 11—An investigation of charges of political interference in the Anderson public school system today was begun by a three-man committee representing the Indiana division of the North Central Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges.

The committee, which arrived at Anderson yesterday, consisted of Dr. C. G. F. Franzen, Indiana University faculty member and NCASSC Indiana secretary; C. P. Woodruff, principal of Elkhart High School, and Terence Kleckner, director of field service, Indiana State Department of Public Instruction.

The committee was expected to probe circumstances surrounding the unexplained resignation Dec. 9 of Anderson High School Principal Stanley Porter.

Disension Revealed

Disension between Anderson teachers and Archie R. Chadd, superintendent of schools, was revealed in a recent meeting of the Anderson Board of School Commissioners, at which teachers leveled charges of tyranny and indecision against Mr. Chadd and demanded his resignation.

The superintendent, in an Indianapolis press conference, charged Mayor G. Lester McDonald and the Anderson City Council with bringing pressure on school commissioners to resign and with attempting to dictate school board policies and decisions.
