

Group to Meet On Flood Control

Speedway Seeks Federal Funds

Speedway's flood control commission will move nearer soliciting federal appropriations, at a meeting at 7:30 p. m. today in Speedway Town Hall, 1450 Lyndhurst Drive.

The commission, formed of the town board and a people's committee, will name a group to canvass affected residents for an estimate of damage from flooded Big Eagle Creek.

The committee was formed two weeks ago at a mass meeting of 150 resident flood victims in the town hall.

"An estimate of the damage must be calculated before you can ask for federal assistance," J. I. Perrey, chief engineer of the Indiana Flood Control Commission, told the group last week.

Mapping Strategy

Mr. Perrey appeared at a meeting of the Speedway commission in town hall held to map strategy in securing federal appropriations. Also attending to appeal were representatives of flooded communities neighboring Speedway along the Big and Little Eagle Creeks.

"Even if the government helps, it will take a long time," Mr. Perrey said. "All federal appropriations require three acts of Congress," he said.

Although the committee earlier discussed the erection of a levee, talk last week centered around a program to widen the channel of Big Eagle Creek. Members of the commission charged congestion from sewage along the north side of the Tenth Street bridge slowed the run of the creek and helped cause its recent overflow.

Indiana Council of Churches Names Dr. John J. Harmacy

Dr. John J. Harmacy of Indianapolis will serve as the new president of the Indiana Council of Churches and Dr. R. L. Holland as its re-elected general secretary.

The council elected officers at its annual meeting yesterday afternoon in the Second Presbyterian Church. The business session was preceded by a luncheon. Bishop John H. Stamm, of Harrisburg, Pa., president of the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America, spoke at the luncheon in the First Baptist Church.

The Rt. Rev. R. A. Kirchhoffer, bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Indianapolis, was elected first vice president; Mrs. Hazel I. Rudwick of Mishawaka, was re-elected second vice president; Larry Brandon, re-elected treasurer, and Mrs. Ann Hoy, re-elected recording secretary.

Other Resolutions
The council went on record as opposed to the appointment of a representative to the Vatican to replace Myron Taylor who has resigned; as opposed to peacetime military conscription; as in favor of the Langer Bill (S-1847) which would prohibit transportation in interstate commerce of all alcoholic beverage advertising and stop its broadcasting over the air.

Also, the council voted to urge that the Hoover Commission recommendation for reorganizing the Federal Government be put into force at once; that the council develop on the part of its constituency a vital concern for political life, that the election of this year be given careful study with a view to selecting the best available public officials and to register convictions at the ballot box.

Also, that rather than proceed to develop a hydrogen bomb, the council urge the United States government to make every effort for peace.

The council paid tribute to its retiring president, the Rev. A. C. Brooks, pastor of the Third Christian Church.

Hereafter, as soon as arrangements can be made to do so, the council agreed to meet simultaneously in one week, perhaps in April, simultaneously with the Indiana Council of Churchwomen, the State Department of Interdenominational Youth Work and the Pastors' Conference. This would be contrary to the council's traditional custom of meeting in mid-winter.

Reports of all departments of the Indiana Council of Churches in book form, were presented to those attending the annual meeting.
