Second of four free Meet-Your-Orchestra concerts, will be staged on the West Side at 8 p. m. tomorrow.

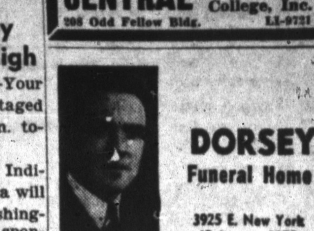
Fabien Sevitzky and the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra will be heard in concert in Washington High School, under the sponsorship of the City of Indianapolis.
