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Boyle Silent On Judge After Seeing Truman

Chairman Doesn't Deny That He Supports Steckler

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—Democratic National Chairman William M. Boyle Jr., emerged from an hour-long conference with President Truman at the White House last night and declined to say whether or not William E. Steckler, Indianapolis, will be named judge of the Southern Indiana district.

It was the national chairman's first conference on the Indiana and other pending judgeships since he was reported to have had a refresher course in the "Back Steckler" business from Indiana Democratic National Committee Chairman Frank M. McHale in Florida.

Mr. Steckler, public service commissioner, is the McHale candidate and has had strong backing from Mr. Boyle. The latter, however, was reluctant to discuss it. He finally told reporters at the White House that he doesn't deny his support.

"It is up to the President to name the man, of course," he quickly added.

Doesn't Name Others
He refused to mention the names of other judgeship appointments discussed with the President and wouldn't have brought Mr. Steckler into it but for being asked definitely about his support of him.

"I don't deny I'm backing him," he finally said.

Meanwhile, Alex Campbell, Ft. Wayne, was reported to be telling friends here that he knew Mr. Steckler will get the judgeship appointment "within the next two weeks." He said he got this "straight from the horse's mouth," but didn't say what horse.

Rep. Winfield K. Denton, Evansville Democrat, and other candidates mentioned and mentioned remain in the judgeship race, however. It will not be finally settled until President Truman sends the name to the Senate.

Indiana stories that failure to name Mr. Steckler would practically wreck the Democratic Party in the state continue to be scoffed at here.

It is pointed out that Mr. McHale's failure to put John Hurt, Martinsville, secretary of the Democratic State Committee, in the U. S. attorneyship, followed by a judgeship disappointment might hurt his prestige but not necessarily the party.

Label Also on Campbell
The McHale label also has been put on Mr. Campbell, who, while still in the Justice Department here, was sure of Mr. Hurt's appointment. Instead the McHale forces settled for a compromise when Matthew E. Welch, Vincennes, 7th District Democratic chairman, was given the U. S. attorneyship. Reports are that the McHale camp may be getting ready to settle for someone else for the judgeship now.

Associate Justice Sherman Minton of the Supreme Court backed his former law clerk, Marshall Hanley, Muncie city attorney, for the U. S. attorneyship when he (Mr. Minton) still was on the U. S. Court of Appeals in Chicago.

Appointed to the Supreme Court, Justice Minton has advanced no candidate for the Indianapolis bench. He is vitally interested because, as the justice in charge of the Seventh Judicial Circuit comprising Indiana, Illinois and Wisconsin, it is his duty to supervise these courts.

Mr. Boyle refused to say that he is backing the McHale candidate for the Senate—Mr. Campbell. He said that the senatorship is a state convention choice and the national chairman will support the nominee.

President Truman reportedly is piqued at Mr. Campbell for allegedly exploiting the customary White House letter of acceptance of the Campbell resignation from the Justice Department to foster his senatorial candidacy.

Mr. Campbell was Assistant Attorney General in charge of the criminal division and claims credit for prosecuting all the spies and Reds.

Board Studies Overcrowding In School 72

PTA Delegation Asks Action to Handle Rise in Enrollment

The School Board today began a study of methods to relieve overcrowding at School 72, 1202 E. Troy Ave.

A delegation of 12 members of the PTA building committee of the school brought the serious "housing shortage" at the school to the attention of the board in its meeting last night.

Surveys of families already living in the school district, prepared by the group, showed enrollment would be higher in the fall term than it was last October when half days were required because of overcrowded classrooms.

William H. Faust, spokesman for the School 72 delegation, said the school population would increase by 60 each year for the next five years. He warned enrollment would top the 900 mark by 1954 while existing facilities are adequate for less than 600 pupils.

"This situation is part of the over-all housing shortage of the school city," J. Dwight Peterson, board president, said. He promised board study of remedial measures.

Addition Approved
Preliminary plans for construction of a 10-room addition to School 91, at 5111 Evanston Ave., were approved. Cost of the project was estimated at \$385,000.

The board also sanctioned the expenditure of \$16,558 for Crispus Attucks High School shop equipment; science equipment for Broad Ripple High School totaling \$2497, and \$2238 for 25 sets of encyclopedias for use in the school system.

Authorization was granted for the hiring of engineers to draw up complete plans for the re-wiring and relighting of the Central Library.

Emil V. Schaad was appointed chairman of the buildings and grounds committee for 1950. Other appointments by J. Dwight Peterson, School Board president, included Leon C. Thompson, chairman of the finance committee; Mrs. Louis W. Bruck, chairman of the library committee; and the Indianapolis Symphony Society and the Children's Museum, and Raymond F. Brandes, member of the board of the Herron Art Institute.

Cites Times Gift
Board members cited The Times for a gift to the Indianapolis library system of microfilm records of daily editions dating from Jan. 1, 1949.

Henry Manz, Times business manager, said the library would receive current microfilm records of the Times as they are completed.

A special meeting of the board was called for 2 p. m. Friday in which bids will be opened for School Building Bonds of February, 1950, totaling \$440,000. The bonds were issued to provide funds for the construction of a new School 77 at 6026 Pleasant Pl. Pkwy.
