

School Walkout At Kokomo Ends

Mass Meeting Called for Tonight

KOKOMO, Feb. 2.—Striking Kokomo high school students were back in their classes today, but a mass meeting, along with adult sympathizers, is called for tonight.

The two-day walkout of more than 1000 students was ended by a two-day "truce" after a student negotiating committee last night heard the School Board's report on the demolition of the head football coach.

Tonight's session, in the CIO United Steelworkers Hall, was called for further discussion.

A committee of 13 pupils representing the strikers met last night with the School Board and School Supt. O. M. Swihart. The session lasted two hours and 40 minutes.

Praise Coach


The committee members demanded to know why Raymond (Tubby) Trobaugh had been relieved as football coach. They pointed out that no coach or teacher is more popular with the students and the Mr. Trobaugh has had winning teams.

The records show that in his 13 years as coach of the Wildcat grid teams he has won 58.7 per cent of his games. His best year was 1939, when the squad was declared "mythical state champs" after an undefeated season.

Challenge Charge

The charge by Supt. Swihart that Coach Trobaugh was "unable to get along with the remainder of the athletic department" was challenged by other members of the department and school faculty. They said they had "not heard of any friction between Tubby and the other members of the faculty."

Building Permits Show Increase

January Construction Set at \$1.9 Million

Construction of new buildings and alterations to buildings in Indianapolis continued its rapid pace in January.

The City Building Commissioner's office today reported an increase in permits and construction value last month compared to a corresponding period in 1949.

Last month, 1511 permits were issued for construction valued at \$1.9 million. This marked an increase of 149 permits and building worth \$674,822 over January, 1949, the office reported.

Of the total last month, 69 permits were approved for single and double dwellings valued at \$447,300. Permits for construction of the \$375,000 Granville Apartments, 6102-16 Carvel St., was also approved.

Nine permits for commercial structures worth \$377,000 and 87 grants for repairs and alterations valued at \$274,782 were also issued.

In January, 1949, 1362 permits for construction worth \$1.2 million were granted, records disclosed.
