

# Game Guards Round up 2 Deer Hunters

Wait 22 Nights in Brown County Woods for Quarry

Twenty-two nights in the woods of Brown County paid off last night for three enforcement officers of the Indiana Department of Conservation.

For more than three weeks the officers, one a former Marine, scouted the wooded hills on the trail of deer hunters. Last night they arrested two men who possessed a freshly killed deer.

Department officials said deer hunting in Brown County with high-powered rifles has been reported recently in the area. Until last night, officers were unable to find hunters with the evidence needed to make an arrest.

**Stand Near Hunters**  
During the search, the officers often stood unnoticed for 20 minutes near armed hunters who waited in the woods for deer.

Arrested last night were Floyd Carter and Altra Greathouse. They were charged with unlawful possession of game. Their case will be transferred today from Justice of the Peace Court to a circuit court for trial.

During the arrest, officers said, Carter boasted of the "beautiful running shot" he made in killing the animal.

Officers who made the arrest were Ernest Fishel, Robert Langley and Eugene Clark. Mr. Clark is a former Marine. All are graduates of the conservation school held last year at McCormick's Creek State Park.



## Faces Court Today In \$3517 Theft

Wolcott Bank Cashier Seized by FBI

A Wolcott, Ind., bank cashier will appear before a U. S. Commissioner today, charged with the misapplication of \$3517.78 in funds.

Bespectacled, modest-appearing Donald J. Heater, 28, was arrested by FBI agents here yesterday after he unexpectedly admitted covering up part of a \$13,733 embezzlement by his sweetheart.

Heater's bride-to-be, attractive Norma Benner, 23, bookkeeper at the Wolcott bank, was arrested Friday. A routine annual audit by examiners of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. uncovered discrepancies in her accounts.

## Keeps Shortage Secret

The cashier admitted failing to report shortages when questioned yesterday in the office of Francis J. Moore, state supervisor of financial institutions.

Bank directors listening to his story of manipulations were amazed, they said. Heater had been a cashier four years and was a respected native of the community.

Heater, like his fiancée, refused to reveal what became of the money. He implied they had intended to make up the shortages before they were married.

Miss Benner, 1948 honor graduate of Wolcott High School, is free on \$17,000 bond. Heater was confined in Marion County jail awaiting his appearance in the Federal Building this morning.




