

Jacobs Again Votes Against Korean Aid

New Measure Passes House By 240-134 Vote

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10—Despite administration pleas, Rep. Andrew Jacobs, Indianapolis Democrat, again voted against Korean aid. He had done so when the \$60 million Korean aid bill was defeated by the House two weeks ago.

The new measure, known as the Far Eastern economic assistance bill, passed the House yesterday 240 to 134. It links the \$60 million for Korea with approval for use of previously appropriated funds by the Chinese Nationalists on Formosa.

Joining the two cut down opposition and a Hoosier from Gary, Assistant Secretary of State Jack McFall, was on Capitol Hill helping push the bill through. One hundred and ninety-eight Democrats and 42 Republicans voted for it. Mr. Jacobs was the only Hoosier Democrat who did not do so.

Voting Against

Indiana Republicans voting against it were Reps. Halleck, Harden and Harvey. Rep. Earl Wilson (R. Ind.) was absent.

Democrats from the state voting for it were Reps. Madden, Crook, Kruse, Walsh, Noland and Denton.

"I saw no reason to change my mind about Korean aid," Mr. Jacobs explained today. "We are playing power politics in a place where we cannot sustain our position. Our own chief-of-staff testified that Korea was of no value for U. S. defense purposes. In my opinion it is better for us not to scatter our eggs all over the world."

"History is the great director. It may be generations before Asia finally settles down to the form of government they want there. There isn't much we can do about it in the interim."

Jenner Speaks

In addressing the Executives Club in Chicago today, Sen. William E. Jenner (R. Ind.) attacked the whole approach to foreign spending as unconstitutional. Pointing out that the Constitution provides for Senate ratification of treaties, he said,

"The Senate has approved 125 treaties, but during the same period 783 executive agreements have been made, most of which the Senate has never had a chance to consider."

"It is now a matter of record that secret diplomacy and power politics lost the peace for us following the first World War."

The American people are beginning to learn that this time we lost the peace long before the second World War was over, in the outrageous secret conferences at Teheran, Yalta, Potsdam and Moscow."

Durham Says He Has 'Frame' Proof

Names 2 Who 'Try To Get Rid of Me'

Suspended Police Officer Jacque (Jack) Durham today told the Safety Board that he had "positive proof" that he was being framed by brother officers.

Mr. Durham took the stand in his trial before the Board of Public Safety and identified Detective Sgts. Spurgeon Davenport and James Rogers as the men who were "trying to get rid of me."

Durham, the Police Department's stormy petrel, is on trial for "failing to arrest a known fugitive."

The suspended officer testified he received a telephone call from a brother officer on Oct. 9, 1949, informing him that he (Durham) was about to be framed "out of a job."

Identified Caller

At first the witness refused to identify the caller. But under pressure from Safety Board members he identified the caller as Patrolman John T. Bailey.

"Bailey told me," Durham testified, "that he overheard a conversation in a North Side tavern" between Rogers and Davenport. Bailey told me the two detective sergeants were trying to frame me."

Previous testimony indicated that two fugitives, Charles Price Webb and James Childs, later arrested in a Rushville tavern burglary, were visitors in Durham's home at 2802 Franklin Pl. while they were being sought by Indianapolis police. Durham has consistently denied the charge.


Draft Boards To Close Monday

Indianapolis draft boards will be closed Monday in observance of Lincoln's birthday. Brig. Gen. Robinson Hitchcock, state director of selective service, said today.

The general said about 32 other boards throughout the state are housed in state and county buildings and will also be forced to close in observance of the state holiday.

Gen. Hitchcock said boys reaching their 18th birthday are still required to register for selective service, although no inductions are being made. Failure to register may result in prosecution for delinquency, Gen. Hitchcock declared.

Eighteen-year-olds are required to register within five days after their birthday. All young men between 18 and 26 are required to register.
