'Good for the Soul'—Hoosier Student Confesses 2 Holdups, Repays Victims

Bible Institute Undergrad Sends Interest With Money 'Borrowed' in Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES, Apr. 7 (UP)—Three years ago a youth robbed feed store owner Robert Gray of \$150, but told him he was only "borrowing" the money.

Mr. Gray found out today that the holdup man wasn't fooling. An Indiana Bible Institute student admitted robbing Mr. Gray and a Pacific Electric bus driver here three years ago. But he returned every penny he took.

S. A. Witmer, president of the Ft. Wayne Bible Institute, revealed details of the strange situation to Los Angeles County Sheriff Eugene Biscailuz.

Mr. Witmer said Albert Luscumb, the student, confessed that he held up a Pacific Electric bus.

Holdup Man Loses Nerve, Captured

A man wearing a private detective's badge and armed with an automatic pistol of foreign make, was in jail today after "losing his nerve" in a holdup attempt.

Police charged Henry Clay Dickson, 32, of 126 S. Illinois St., with violating the 1935 Firearms Act and pre-robbery. He was identified by Steve Rosenbaum, 2440 Central Ave., a taxi driver, as the man who tried to hold him up.

Mr. Rosenbaum told police he picked Dickson up at a downtown corner and took him to Sherman Dr. and Michigan St. He said his passenger produced a gun and said, "Let me have it" as they reached the destination.

Mr. Rosenbaum hesitated, however, and told police the man jumped from the car and ran. He was picked up a block away and identified by the taxi driver.

May Dig Up Road For Gold Hoard

SCHUMACHER, Ontario, Apr. 7 (UP)—Town officials considered digging up a road today to check the story of a dying man that \$500,000 in gold rush treasure was buried under it when the town was a mining camp.

Authorities said magnetometer tests indicated that something is buried at the spot described by the man. However, the deposit could not be identified as gold, they said, without digging up the road.
