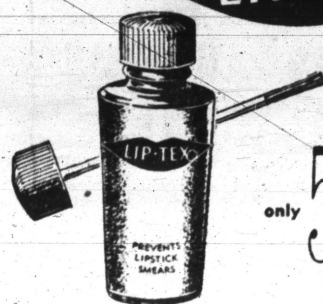




**Rev. George Mackey To Address Dinner**

Bing was at CBS Playhouse No. 2 with Fred Allen cutting a record for a radio program to be heard May 17—a month after Bing's gone to Europe.

Now that's a pretty good show there—Crosby and Fred. And Bill Morrow, Bing's producer, had done a great "scripting job."

Fred came in a couple of seconds late, explaining that he'd thought the applause, when his name was announced, would last longer.

"They forget you," said Bing, who had on a jacket, for a change, over his rainbow-colored shirt. "Sic transit gloria."

"GLORIA SWANSON?" said Fred, then he added, "Sic transit—that's riding in an ambulance, isn't it?"

Fred, claiming he was unable to get work, wanted to be the announcer, and insisted his voice was as good as Arthur Godfrey's. "When Godfrey sings," Fred said, "they have to step on a bullfrog to get the pitch."

Bing up to now has no interest in television, but Bob is eager, and I found him at the Nola Studios, upstairs over Lindy's with Douglas Fairbanks Jr. and various writers and assistant geniuses working on the Easter \$40,000 show.

That reminded me of another line from Bing's program. "Hope made so much money

here, when he left town his girls were bulging." Fred said—and Bing replied, "His girls were bulging before he came to town."

ACTUALLY HOPE is working feverishly to put on a better show than has been done yet by anybody.

The great composer, Richard Rodgers, was sitting there waiting to ask Hope to help out with a benefit—next September. "How dare he keep me waiting?" laughed Rodgers. "I'm going to ask him a favor."

Bob had a line in his Easter show addressed to a model: "What's your name, honey?" She is to answer, "Gloria—they call me the girl with the hour-glass figure."

And Bob says, "Baby, it's later than you think." But I started out to say that with television competing with other television shows, and radio trying to hold on, and thus competing with all of them, lucky, lucky us!

And so, after all this free entertainment for years, what will happen in the end? I imagine that's where the actors who have done it will get

Martin Block realizes the race track may not be educational, but at least you always come home with that nice clean feeling. ... That's Earl, brother.

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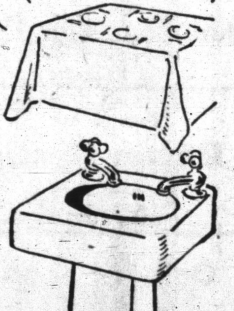
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
