

Schricker Lists Appointments

Posts on 4 Boards, Commissions Filled

Gov. Schricker today announced a series of appointments to four state boards and commissions.

Reappointed to the Indiana Flood Control and Water Resources Commission for three-year terms were Fred F. Bays, Merom, Ralph Roessler, Marion, and Richard C. Heck, Madison. Carlos A. Lita of Peru was appointed to succeed Asher Gray of Wabash. Don Scism of Evansville was named to succeed Nelson E. Kelley of Mt. Vernon.

The Governor reappointed Mrs. Benjamin D. Hitz, Indianapolis to the State Board of Public Welfare for a term of four years.

Clarence F. Aumann, Indianapolis chiropractor, and Clarence B. Blakeslee, Indianapolis osteopath, were reappointed to the State Board of Medical Registration and Examination. Dr. Michael Shellhouse, Gary, was appointed to the state board to succeed Dr. Will A. Thompson, Liberty. The appointments are effective Apr. 23.

The Governor also reappointed to the Indiana Real Estate Commission Roy Leonard, Vincennes, Roscoe Martin, Logansport, and John McGinnis, Columbus. These appointments begin May 1.

IR Reports 1949 Loss of \$466,787

Receipts Decline Despite 2 Rate Hikes

The city's transit system lost money in 1949 despite two fare increases.

In the annual report of Indianapolis Railways, Inc., company officials today reported the city's buses and trolleys lost \$466,787.77 during 1949.

It was the second consecutive year the transit firm lost money. In 1948, the company reported a loss of \$211,903.

Company officials attributed the financial loss to a reduction in the number of passengers because of increased automobile registration and the spread of the five-day work week.

The company was granted a 1-cent fare raise in July and another 1-cent in December by the Indiana Public Service Commission.

Expenses Reduced

The company's operating expenses, before taxes and depreciation, were reduced more than \$150,000 last year. This reduction, however, was more than offset by the loss of transportation revenues during the year.

The company reported that 10 new passenger twin coaches were added to the transit fleet in 1949. This purchase increased to 203 the number of vehicles the transit firm has purchased since the war.

Total expenditures on new buses and trolleys since the war has been more than \$3 million, according to the company.

Two Named to Board Of Methodist Hospital

William B. Schiltz was re-elected president of the board. Other officers re-elected were W. H. Forse, Anderson, first vice president; Dr. Jean S. Milner, second vice president; William G. Davis, third vice president; J. Floyd King, treasurer, and Dr. Edward W. Smith, secretary.

Dr. Smith was named to three-year terms on the board.

A memorial bronze tablet to the late Arthur V. Brown, president of the board from 1922 to 1942, was unveiled during the meeting, which was held in Wile Hall. The plaque will be hung in the hospital lobby.

Coroner Probes Death of Nurse In Tourist Cabin

A DEPUTY coroner today was investigating the death of a 22-year-old registered nurse whose body was found yesterday in a tourist cabin at 7628 E. Washington St. She was identified as Mrs. Mary Ann Starks Colvin, 1717 N. Illinois St., a graduate of Methodist Hospital Nursing School.

Deputy Coroner Joseph Jewett said he found a quantity of unlabeled medicine bottles in the room. He said there was no evidence of foul play, but an autopsy is being conducted to determine the cause of death.

DR. JEWETT estimated that Mrs. Colvin had been dead about 18 hours when found.

The victim's husband, George Colvin, has been a patient at Veterans Administration Hospital, Cold Springs Rd., for several months as the result of a spinal injury suffered in an auto accident.

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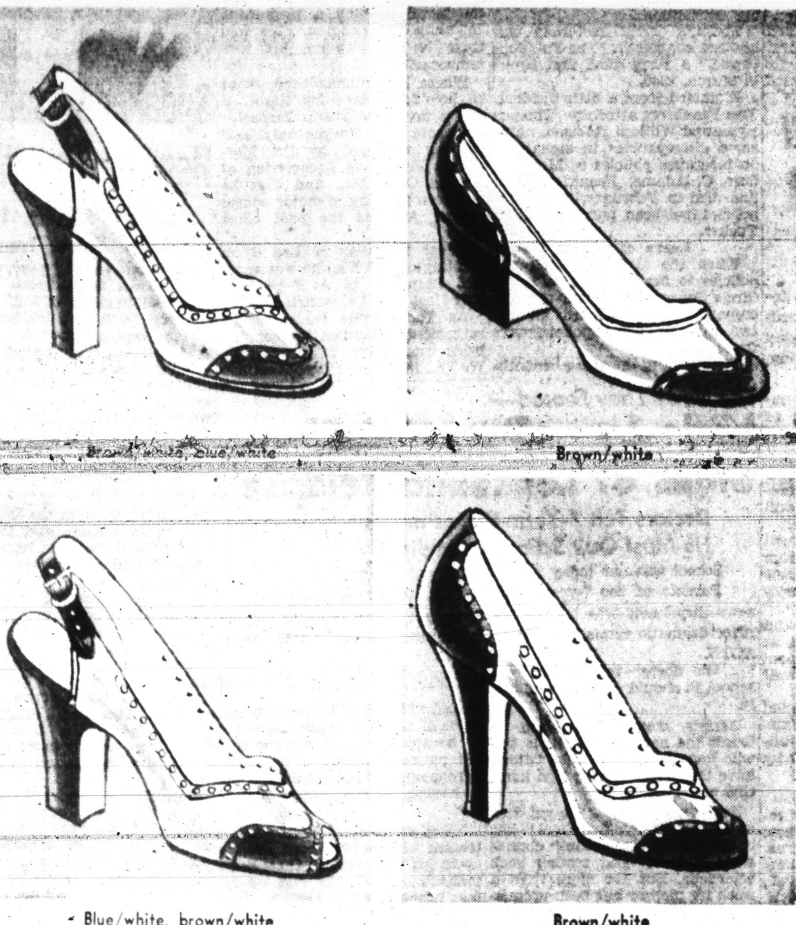
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
