Urges Truman Appoint New Loyalty Board

Sen. Mundt Declares Only Bipartisan Group Can Meet Present Challenge

Sen. Karl E. Mundt (R. S. D.) today urged President Truman to junk his loyalty program and start over with a top board to include Republicans chosen by the party's "recognized leaders."

"Ineffective," the President's program of loyalty checks for government employees, said the Senator who participated in the House Un-American Activities Committee inquiry into the Alger Hiss case. A new approach is needed to meet the challenge of communism, he said.

Any group "selected by the administration to investigate its own appointees cannot adequately meet the current challenge unless comprised equally of Republicans and Democrats," he said. He cited the perjury indictment a New York grand jury returned against William Remington, Commerce Department employee who had been given a loyalty clearance after he denied charges that he was a Communist.

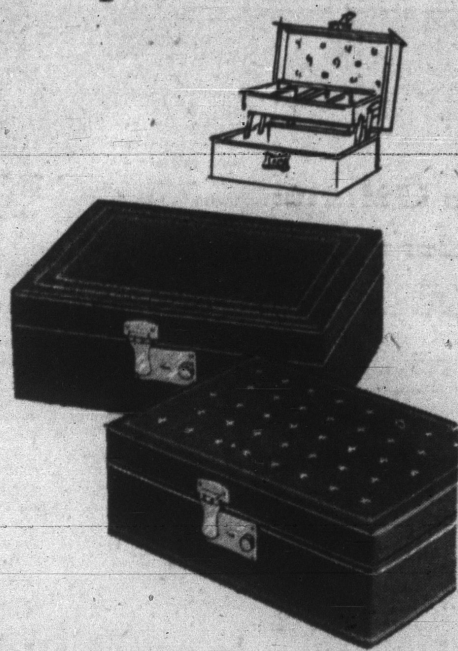

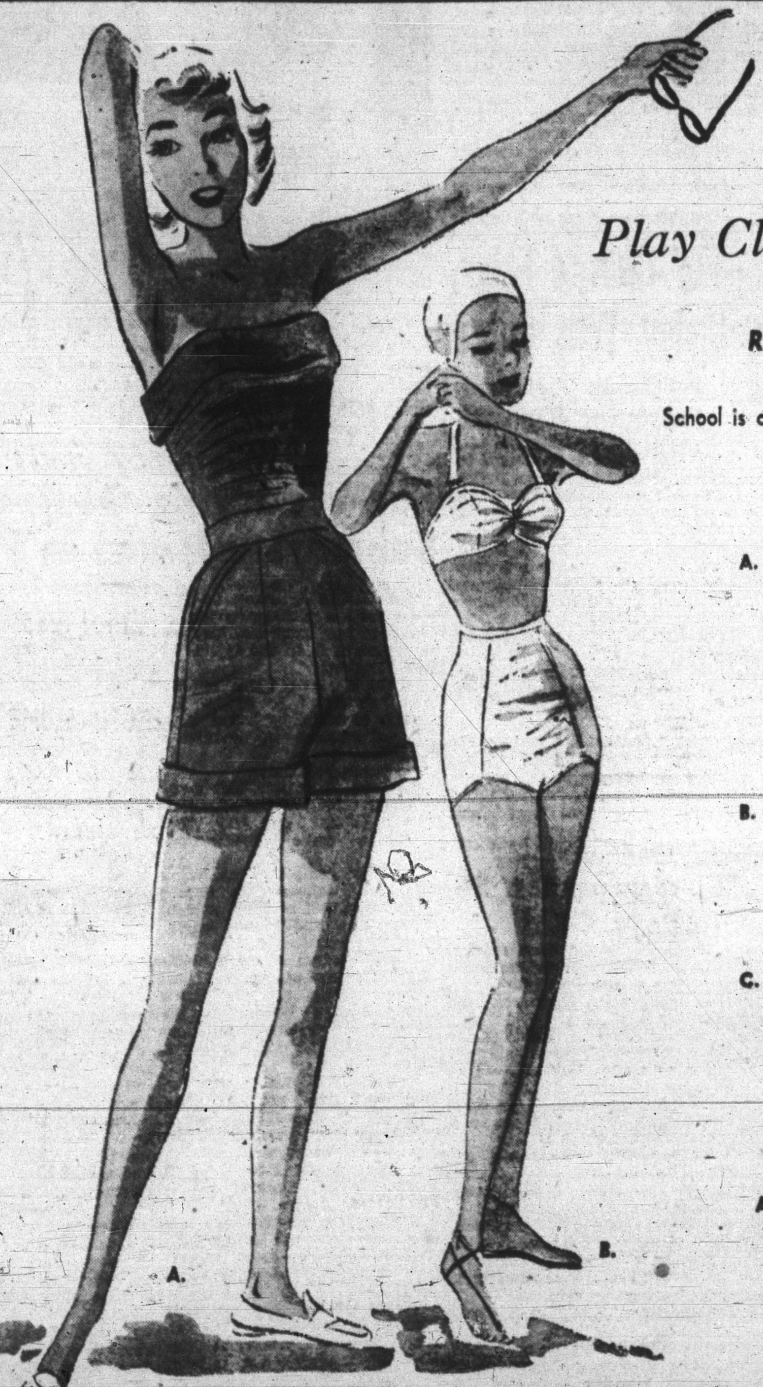
