Use Pure DDT
Purdue warns that only purified DDT is safe to use on cucumbers and melon vines. Ordinary grades may kill the plants as well as the cucumber bugs. Rotten copper dust or calcium arsenate copper dust will also protect vines against beetles. Bug treatment is unnecessary once the plants begin to vine but diseases may still do harm.
