

Use Pure DDT

Purdue warns that only purified DDT is safe to use on cucumbers and melon vines. Ordinary grades may kill the plants as well as cucumber bugs, Rotenone-copper dust or calcium arsenate copper dust will also protect vines against beetles. Bug treatment is unnecessary once the plants begin to vine but diseases may still do harm.
