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Ask Receivership For Bible Firm

First of Several Suits Filed Here

The first of a series of lawsuits asking a receivership be appointed for the American Bible Chautauque, Inc., was filed today in Superior Court 1.

Three women, former members of the evangelistic group, charged the corporation failed to make good on notes signed in May, 1949.

Mrs. Marie Tucker, 3313 Grace-land Ave., asks payment on a \$200 note; Mrs. Emma McClure, 1827 Singleton St., a \$100 note, and Mrs. Marie Peterson, 1352 N. Olney Ave., a \$50 note.

The complaint alleges the notes, signed by Bill Opie as president, and his brother, T. Jack Opie, as secretary of the corporation, were not paid.

The complaint also says the assets of the corporation total about \$10,000 and the liabilities not more than \$20,000. The women are requesting a receiver be appointed.

Bill Opie now faces charges in Criminal Court 1 that he and Elmer L. Kiel sold securities of the American Bible Chautauque, Inc., while not licensed by the State Securities Commission. They are charged in an affidavit signed by Mrs. McClure.

The women charge in the complaint that the Opie brothers sold lots near Noblesville over a year ago.

The notes, identical except for names and dollar amounts, read: "Fourteen months after date we promise to pay to the order of (the women)—\$. . . at Noblesville, Ind., for value received with- out any relief whatever from valuation or appraisal laws with 10 per cent interest from maturity until paid and attorneys' fees."

Firm Designed Coliseum Here

Services for William Earl Russ, prominent Indianapolis architect, will be at 10:30 a. m. Wednesday in Flanner & Buchanan mortuary. Burial will be in Dayton.

Mr. Russ, who was 72, died yesterday in his home, 3510 N. Pennsylvania St.

He was still an active partner in the firm, Russ & Harrison, which designed many well-known Indianapolis buildings.

The firm designed the \$2.5 million Lockfield Gardens Federal Housing Project and the Coliseum at the Indiana State Fairgrounds.

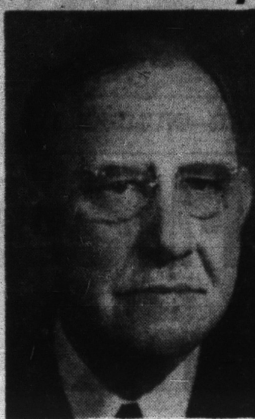
Other buildings which were designed by the partners were the Irvington Presbyterian Church, the Fall Creek Ordinance Plant and the Jefferson Proving Ground in Madison. They also designed the Meridian Street Methodist Church which is now under construction at 5500 N. Meridian St.

A native of Dayton, O., Mr. Russ had his own business before becoming associated with Merritt Harrison in 1934. He had lived in Indianapolis 21 years.

His office was at 1001 Architects & Builders building. Mr. Russ was graduated from Steele High School, Dayton, and from Columbia University. He was a member of the Indianapolis Athletic Club and the Columbia Club, and attended St. Paul's Episcopal Church.

Surviving are his daughter, Mrs. Deane Meier, Washington, D. C., and a sister, Mrs. John M. Patterson, Dayton. His wife, Ethel, died 35 years ago.
