### Plant, Grocery Safes Yield Meager Loot

Safecrackers are hardworking fellows, but they certainly show little imagination.

Police today reported two assaults on safes, both of them repeating operations of a few months ago.

Net result was about \$200 in a safe taken from the Powers Grocery, 2147 Talbot Ave., and about \$40 of personal belongings from the American Paper Stock Co., 320 Michigan St.

The night of May 1 this year burglars entered the Powers grocery by jimmying the front door and left with a safe containing \$297. Four days later the safe was found in a field near 3400 Kessler Blvd. Owner Richard Powers had the safe repaired and returned to use.

**Repeat Performance**  
Last night burglars again jimmyed the front door and left with the same safe.

Police said they will search the field near 3400 Kessler Blvd.

The paper firm safecrackings were hardly worth all the sweat.

**Leave Empty-Handed**  
Last October burglars entered the plant through a window on the west side of the building and went to work on a seven-foot safe. Best they could do was break the handle. After ransacking locker rooms, they left with nothing.

Last night the burglars entered through the same window. This time they took a crack at a smaller safe, rolling it to a freight elevator and taking it downstairs. They chiseled out the bottom but found no money—only papers.

Just for spite, the burglars entered a men's locker room and left with an employee's bowling equipment.

### Insurance Firm

#### Refused New License

State Insurance Commissioner Frank J. Viehmann today refused to renew a license of the Rhode Island Insurance Co. His action, in effect, makes it impossible for the company to sell insurance in Indiana.

Mr. Viehmann said he considered the firm "in danger of insolvency," and he "took the necessary steps" to protect policyholders in the state.

The Superior Court of Providence, R. I., appointed Thomas J. Meehan, Providence, as receiver of the property assets and business of the company. Mr. Viehmann advised all Indiana policyholders and claimants to file sworn statements of their claims to the director of business regulation, Providence.

### Pond Is Dredged—

#### At \$246,500 Saving

PULASKI, N. Y., July 27 (UP)—A Syracuse physician, Dr. Stanley Groman, said today he saved U. S. taxpayers \$246,500.

He explained it this way: For more than a year boat owners tried to interest federal and state officials in dredging a channel in Big Sandy Pond, off the eastern shore of Lake Ontario.

Army engineers said they couldn't estimate when the job would be done and said it would cost \$250,000 in public funds.

Dr. Groman and C. H. Snitchler, of Pulaski, raised some money and let a dredging contract to a private firm which promised to finish the job in 10 days. The cost: \$3500.

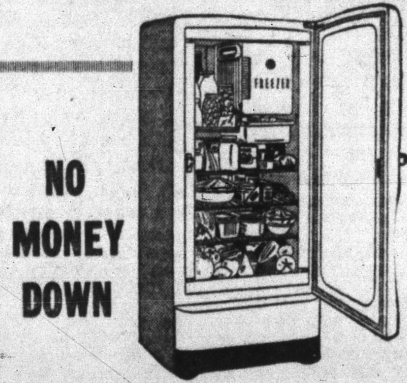

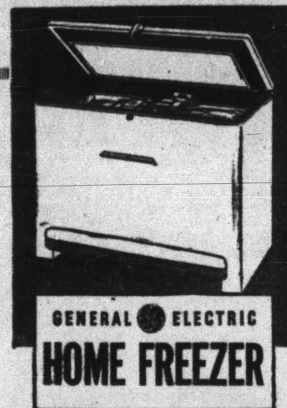

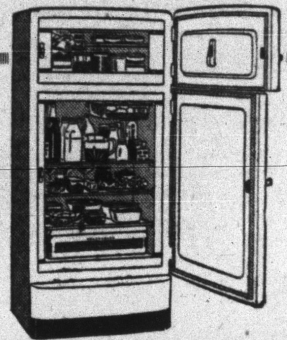
